But it's not the countries with the greatest need that are catching too many of these fish – it's the subsidised fishing fleets from the rich countries. These fleets don't just trawl the open ocean they fish off the coasts of developing countries, robbing local fishers and their communities of desperately needed food supplies. And as technology has developed, the crisis has accelerated.

Mid-winter is a quiet time for Umbarra but a few things have been happening this month. This visit forms part of a new unit introduced at the school that examines the relationships between indigenous and other Australians. The unit includes looking at heritage and culture, *terra nullius*, the stolen generation through to land rites and modern day relationships.

As with all building maintenance and restoration the costs can be surprisingly high and the committee finds itself in a familiar position of needing to make up a shortfall in funds. This contribution is very timely and we dedicate the triangular gable ends to The Triangle. Plans are afoot for a fundraising curry night with Janine and Val Halasz in the kitchen - watch this space for date and details'.

Central Tilba's small hall was sale of town allotments in 1895. It was built as a Temperance Hall and would have been the first public/ community facility in the village. The big hall was built about 1914 and was first used as a roller skating rink, but was then converted into a dance

hall. Can you imagine the stories the walls could tell over 102 years of public use and gatherings? Current use of the two halls is frequent and varied. It can be a wedding reception one day, a meeting space or a show venue the next.

Specific community use of the two halls includes Central Tilba's Food Coop. This group was formed in 1985 and bulk buys about \$10,000 worth of wholefoods three times a year to distribute to up to 110 families. The group used to order through Northern Wholefoods at Coffs Harbour, but now use South Coast Distributors from Ulladulla and our own Tilba Dromadeli. These Coop days, where members get together and weigh up and package ordered items, are quite a social day and allow periodic socialising for far-flung families. Rici Tandy and
