"One hundred percent" Wednesday

The 100% Renewables Community Campaign is an amalgam of local groups throughout Australia that are particularly interested in moving to clean renewable energy. They include grass roots activists, some of the Transition Towns movement and our own Clean Energy for Eternity among others. During the last four

months there has been a concerted effort to influence the Multi-Party Climate Change Committee (MPCCC) to try and ensure that they include support for renewable energy when structuring the carbon price. About hundred eight volunteers from seventy two groups spent hours gathering responses questions about energy renewable and pricing pollution at farmers' markets, meetings and just door knocking. Together we

collected over 14,000 conversations.

Feeling (justifiably?) content with this effort those of us who were able to make the trip to Canberra headed off to present the results to the movers and shakers in Parliament. Ten of us plus three solar panels had to be cleared by security the Senate Lawn. We gathered in the public space and waited. And chatted and relaxed until the big moment.

Senator Christine Milne's staffer Tim Hollo collected us at the reception desk where we were given tickets that showed us to be "escorted visitors" and then we were led through the doors and

into the corridors of power. The whole thing was quite a hoot and a lot fun. First Tim gave us an outline of the procedure and we discussed who would stand where, when and how we would hand over the report and were advised to walk

prior to the meeting which was held on boldly out onto the lawn preferably without tripping over, across the courtyard to where the media would hopefully be waiting. Our biggest worry was perhaps that there would be no media there but as we stepped out, heads held high and solar panels at the ready there were media in abundance.

Of course they were really waiting

for the politicians but they listened to us first. Then **MPCCC** members Senator Milne and Adam Bandt appeared but just as the report was about to be handed over bells rang somewhere and Adam Bandt took off post haste to attend a division. The press asked Christine Milne questions about everything except the report she was there to receive, then Adam Bandt returned and Rob Oakshott turned up as well and everybody talked to everyone. Sadly Greg Combet did not attend

and no government members were there.

Adam Bandt left his staffer with us and we had something to eat at the pollies cafe, then afterwards back to the public area and into the cafe to debrief. What a nice way to spend a Wednesday afternoon.

Carbon tax or Carbon Cap?

Carbon tax or emission trading? Which is which, what is what? The other day listening to Radio National I heard the clearest and simplest explanation, so for those who are as confused as I was, let me try to be as succinct.

A carbon tax is a tax on the amount of carbon released/created. This system

brings better certainty for businesses and I suppose domestic, because once you've worked out your carbon emissions you can work out your tax. However, this system does nothing (except financially) to bring emissions

Emission trading puts a cap on the amount of emissions allowable but

the price will be subject to market forces and will go up and down, which will make it more difficult for businesses to work out their financial liabilities.

In an ideal world both systems would work together, but that seems unlikely in today's political climate.

Hope that helps.

The ABC South East recently ran a program highlighting concerns of residents in Tathra regarding poor mobile phone coverage through Telstra. Mr Chris Taylor, General Manager of Telstra Countrywide was invited to discuss the issue. Mr Taylor maintained that only a small pocket of Telstra customers were affected. Well, apparently the phones ran hot with angry Telstra customers from all over the area ringing in to complain about poor mobile service.

I sent an email to the ABC telling them about my Wireless Broadband service in Fairhaven – which is practically non-existent and the difficulties I have had with Telstra trying to have this rectified. My email was read out on air and the answer given by Mr Taylor virtually said if I was not happy, I could go to another company!

I maintain that Telstra sold me a service then failed to meet their obligation to provide the service I was paying for. I had to accept a Wireless service because Telstra could not provide ADSL in my area. The problem of poor signal was rectified by the simple addition of an antenna, which now gives me a good signal - but at a cost to me! My argument is that Telstra should fulfil its obligation to provide the service I am paying for – even if it means providing an antenna as part of the service. My problem is now solved after Mr Taylor rang me and has agreed to

refund the cost of the antenna "as a gesture of good faith".


Whenever I speak to someone about Telstra, the usual beginning of the sentence is "Bloody Telstra" So, I have been thinking about what I can do about it. I have learnt that it does pay to complain - but am afraid that too many people simply look at this as too difficult, and that their voices would not be heard anyway.

Now that I have the ear (and email address) of Chris Taylor from Telstra, who has said to me that he would welcome any complaints from Telstra customers, I am giving all our readers in the Triangle the opportunity to complain loud and long.

Do you live in an area where you get little or no internet connection? Do you just hate it when you get put onto an offshore operator who cannot understand? Can you understand your Telstra bill (thinking you need a university degree to fathom it out)? Or are you just fed up with Telstra's huge glossy advertising campaigns when your mobile phone constantly drops out or just doesn't have a signal?

We will ensure that all your letters and email will be sent to Chris Taylor at Telstra, who has also agreed to visit this area and talk to Telstra customers if needed. So, this is your chance to have your complaints heard and hopefully we, the residents of South East NSW will start to get decent services from Telstra.

Dear Editor,

I write in reference to the article "Responsible dog walking on our beaches", published in Issue No. 97, May 2011.

While agreeing with the general content of the article, I would bring to your attention two errors it contained.

The Bega Valley Shire Council (BVSC) booklet Companion Animals Guide, page 5, clearly lists only two leash free areas where dogs can be exercised at all times. They are Haywards Beach south of Camel Rock and Headland Reserve, Bermagui, from the lookout opposite the Caravan Park and south to the headland. These zones are signposted.

The southern section of Beares Beach listed as leash free in the published article, is not listed in the official guide.

The article is also misleading in that it implies that Baragoot Beach is off limits to all dogs due to its proximity to the Biamaga National Park. This is incorrect. Baragoot Beach is not located in the Biamaga National Park but adjacent to it. This can be confirmed with National Parks and Wildlife, and/or a topographical map.

Also please note Baragoot Beach is not designated by BVSC as a dog prohibited area.

If necessary I would be agreeable to discuss the foregoing with the author of the article to clarify the points made.



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Carbon Sink Sunk

Shortly Forests NSW will again be logging in compartments 2001 and 2002, an area covering both sides of the Wallaga Lake Road at the Cobargo turn off, including the spotted gum forest walk, the picnic ground and bordering the Cathedral of Trees that frames the entrance to Bermagui, a tourist destination.

Logging in the area is a divisive issue and because I oppose it I think it is incumbent on me to justify my position. There will never be agreement reached by negotiation because there is no negotiation and only a pretence at public consultation. It is a battle for the life of the forest in terms of biodiversity, ecosystem services and carbon sequestration as against short term gain for an industry that mines the timber, burns the residues and sends the product and the profits overseas. Let us be clear. A forest is a long term, surviving, self regulating ecological community. It is not a naturally

occurring plantation that can be harvested at will. Logging as carried out by Forests NSW is the destruction of that forest community and death by a thousand cuts.

We live in an area that should be a massive biodiversity resource bursting with wild life. Instead we have a remnant Koala population hanging on for dear life, small pockets of a surviving potoroo population, maybe a few sugar gliders and occasional wallabies. The spotted quoll has probably gone and maybe the bandicoots too. There are some kangaroos and rabbits in increasing numbers. Many bird species are threatened or endangered and indigenous plant species are overrun by weeds.

We face a real possibility of catastrophic climate change but we log and burn a resource that could help us to avoid it. It may not be widely known but Professor Mackey from ANU has demonstrated the huge potential of these forests to act as a carbon sink that would

mitigate climate change by storing carbon while we struggle to bring our emissions under control.

We log and we burn. We can be smarter than that.

On the 15 May 2011, Russel Hayley, his 16 year old son, Brodie, and his mate Geoff went fishing off Hoyers Reef about half a nautical mile offshore, near the entrance to Wallaga Lake. The sky was blue, the swell was small and Russell was sitting back having a cup of coffee. He looked around and saw a large wave swelling off the Reef. He got to the ignition and turned it on but did not have time to put the boat into gear. The boat rode out the first wave but unfortunately there was a second, bigger breaking wave immediately behind. The second wave rolled the boat. Russell and his son were tipped out but unfortunately Geoff was trapped under water. He managed to get out about 15 seconds later. retrieved lifejackets from the boat. Brodie, a strong swimmer, swam for shore to raise the alarm while Russel

stayed to assist his mate who had a severe gash and a broken leg. Russell then towed Geoff to shore. Geoff was airlifted away at about 1430. Marine Rescue, the surf patrol, the police and ambulance and rescue helicopter attended the incident.

As details were initially unclear, the Marine Rescue lifeboat, the James T. Lees, skippered by Marine Rescue Master Steve Angelo, put in

place a search pattern to search for any survivors still in the water. Fortunately, all were on the beach. However, the James found three pairs of work boots (yes, they float) and a sheepskin cap.

The boat subsequently washed up on the beach. Michael Jubb from the slipway and Peter Blessington, a local farmer with a tractor, tried to salvage

the boat but were unsuccessful. Russell indicated that he can't thank the locals enough for the assistance given to himself, Geoff and Brodie during the incident. In particular he thanked Peter Blessington, Marine Rescue, the Police, Surf Club and Stewie the surfing bobcat driver who happened to be there and lent assistance.

The work of the Handicraft Group deserves special mention. Anyone who enjoys handicraft, a cuppa and a chat is welcome to come along to the rooms in



So, if anyone ever comes across them on a walk in Quaama you know who they belong to. Joan worked as a Data Processor for Bega Airforce headquarters.




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
Hazel Rowley, Franklin and Eleanor: An Extraordinary Marriage, Melbourne University Press, 2011, \$36.99

You might wonder what on earth more could be said about the famous Roosevelts, both having had thousands of words written about them already. But this is a biography with a difference; it's really a biography of a marriage, rather than individual stories. I can vaguely remember reading that there's was an unconventional arrangement, with FDR having other long-term relationships with women - indeed, Lucy Mercer was with him when he died. Eleanor had lesbian relationships, and it was not unusual for her and Franklin to spend long periods apart, particularly when she started to emerge as a strong, independent woman in her own right. Throughout their long marriage, they remained supportive and respectful of each others work and life choices - truly remarkable for the times, and given the

class from which they emerged.

His unprecedented four terms as President covered the Great Depression and the Second World War, an extraordinary public life made more so in the light of the onset of adult polio, which is described with great accuracy but which never descends to sentimentality. The stress of his work, his triumphs in pulling America through the Depression and the War placed enormous strains on the marriage, but her support remained unwavering. In part, it accounts for her ability to continue a remarkable public life after he died, although this is not covered in any detail in the book - for that you have to read her own biography.

It is a tragedy that Rowley died recently; the world has lost a great biographer. Anyone who could find a new angle from which to tell the story of the remarkable Roosevelts deserves all the praise and accolades with which this book was greeted. Don't miss it.

Potatoes, peeled and diced about 2cm square

Chicken legs or pieces
1 tablespoon of olive oil,

oregano or thyme and salt and pepper.

Turn the oven on to 180 degrees. Place the potatoes in a bowl and drizzle with oil and turn them with your hand to make sure they are all coated. Add half a teaspoon of herbs per person then season well with salt and pepper

turning all the while. Then put a little oil in your hands and coat the chicken, season with pepper and salt.

Place the potatoes in a large baking dish making them into a single layer. Put the chicken on top so that the juices run into the potatoes while cooking.

Turn the chicken after twenty minutes and put an egg slice under the potatoes to loosen them to make sure they don't stick

Leave for a further twenty minutes, check the chicken is cooked through and the potatoes are cooked and sticky.

Serve with a salad in the summer or green vegetables in winter.

I like beans that have been sliced in



half lengthways so they are thin, put into boiling water for three minutes or so then drizzled with oil and served with a wedge of lemon to squeeze over the lot!

This dish is a real comfort food for us and I hope you too will enjoy it,
