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How to kill a town without really trying

The media is full of stories of small Australian towns struggling to maintain their businesses and populations. In our own area there are more small towns or villages than there are large towns and they are struggling.

If you live in one of these small towns you become aware of the diversity of people and the entrepreneurial nature of a lot of the residents. Ideas abound, none of them grandiose – just a small business, supposedly the backbone of the Australian economy, that someone thinks is a good idea and may just make them a living and add another attraction to the small town.

Then – smack! – they hit a wall of bureaucracy.

Cobargo is one of these small towns. A number of new businesses have submitted DAs to Council, to find that Council is demanding the business provide a disabled access toilet.

It must be pointed out that this is not a Council bylaw. In May 2011 the Federal

Government passed new anti-discrimination laws:

The Disability (Access to Premises buildings) Standards 2010 (the Premises Standards) commence on 1 May 2011. Any application for a building approval for a new building or upgrade of an existing building on or after that date will trigger the application of the Premises Standards. These standards stipulate that toilet facilities are to be access friendly for disabled people.

However, and this is where communication between Council staff and shopkeepers falls down, there are grounds for exception, all of which probably relate to Cobargo.

To comply with the DA, existing places may need to be modified to be accessible *'except where this would involve "unjustified hardship"*. Section 4 of the Australian Human Rights Commission Disability Guidelines give a comprehensive list of "unjustified hardship"

guidelines but I have cut and pasted just two examples:

Limited application to new parts and 'affected part' in existing buildings

When new building work takes place in an existing building and a building approval is required for that new work, the requirements for upgrading access are limited to the area of new work and the 'affected part'. Access requirements are not imposed outside the area of the new work.

Toilet concession

Section 4.5 provides a concession for existing accessible sanitary compartments. The concession states that certain existing accessible sanitary compartments do not have to comply with AS 1428.1–2009 as generally required by the Access Code.

Also on page 17 of the NSW State Anti-Discrimination Guidelines for Local Councils it states:

Public toilets:

All of Council's public toilets and baby change facilities — in parks, recreation areas, reserves, halls, and so on — need to be provided equally for both sexes and for people with disabilities (and for anyone who needs to accompany them). Not to do so could be either sex or disability discrimination.

And it is this issue that is getting up the nose in Cobargo. While Council strides through Cobargo stonewalling budding new businesses on the grounds of their toilets, Council itself is avoiding upgrading its own toilets.

The Cobargo Business and Tourism Association has been asking Council for an upgrade of the existing appalling public toilets for years and nothing has been done. Instead, Council is demanding that all private businesses comply with a law from which they would in all probability be found to be exempt under the "unjustified hardship" rules.

And to add insult to injury, the latest 'must eat in' restaurant in Sydney, Momofuku Seiobo, which charges \$540.00 for a dinner for two, doesn't have to provide toilets for their patrons. They have to go outside the restaurant and use the public toilets!

BVSC, a reply to this would be very welcome.



Hawksbill Turtle back home, and a very lucky little bird


WIRES would like to thank two very caring people, Lynne Grant and Alex Dryver who found a very sick and exhausted Hawksbill Turtle at Bournda 8 months ago. Motchy (the turtle) was initially cared for by WIRES member Janine Green. After his stay with Janine, Motchy was transferred to the Merimbula Aquarium where he was housed and looked after for 8 months!

On Monday, 26 March, Motchy was deemed fit to go back home to the ocean. It was a very special day. Lynne and Alex, Janine and Michael McMaster who cared for Motchy at the Aquarium, and Anthony Daly, the Aquarium's owner, were chauffeured from Merimbula to Narooma by National Parks and Wildlife Ranger, Craig Dickmann.

In Narooma they were all greeted by National Parks and Wildlife Ranger Cassandra Bendixsen, and skipper Ross Constable, who took them by boat to Montague Island for the release. However, upon arriving at Montague Island, the rangers felt that there were too many fishermen around the island and so Motchy was taken another 300 metres NE of Montague Island to the shelf where he was safely placed in the water and he promptly dove down into the depths of the ocean. Motchy was so happy to be back home that he forgot to wave good-bye!

One Friday afternoon WIRES received a call to rescue a bird in Wyndham. It had been hit by a car. Upon arrival, the WIRES volunteer found this beautiful little Blackfaced Monarch, weighing all of 23 grams. The driver thought he had avoided hitting the bird while driving home with his family to Wyndham. However, what he did not know was that it had become trapped on the front of his car. One of his children discovered it on the ground after arriving home. The little bird had travelled between 10 and 15 kilometres on the front of the car after being hit. It was unbelievably quite bright looking but unable to fly. At an early examination it appeared to be concussed but otherwise to only have minimal injuries.

A later vet check confirmed the concussion and amazingly, considering what had happened to it, no broken bones or dislocations were found. After a couple of days treating it for shock with warmth and rehydration and feeding it mealie worms at quite a rate, it was ready for the aviary. It still could not fly but perched well and made its way quickly a r o u n d the

Narooma builder penalised for water pollution

Ed Kelly Constructions Pty Ltd pleaded guilty to a water pollution charge in Batemans Bay Local Court on Friday and was convicted and ordered to pay more than \$24,000 in fines and costs.

The NSW Environment Protection Authority (EPA) prosecuted Ed Kelly Constructions Pty Ltd for polluting the waters of Forsters Bay near Narooma, which forms part of the Wagonga Inlet and is located within Batemans Marine Park.

The incident occurred on December 2 and 3, 2010, when sediment and erosion controls put in place by the construction company failed during a period of heavy rainfall.

In handing down his judgment, Magistrate Degnan said the company must be alive to the sensitivity of the marine environment at Forsters Bay.

Magistrate Degnan said the construction company should have taken greater precautions to ensure its sediment and erosion controls would be able to withstand periods of heavy rainfall.

Acting Chief Environmental Regulator Mark Gifford said sediment laden water posed a potential threat to any marine ecosystem, but was particularly concerning when it entered a declared Sanctuary Zone.

"Sediment may seem harmless, but it is a serious marine pollutant and Forsters Bay contains high conservation value species and ecosystems," Mr Gifford said.

"Sediment plume pollution can reduce light penetration, smother the marine bed habitat, harm the gills of fish, crustaceans and molluscs, and reduce the food supply for some marine life.

"Parts of Forsters Bay are also used for oyster farming and sediment laden water can harm this industry significantly.

"Heavy rainfall made erosion and sediment control difficult for Ed Kelly Constructions Pty Ltd, but they had already received a formal EPA caution for an incident of water pollution that occurred on the same site on September 10, 2010.

"Sediment is a harmful pollutant in waterways and construction companies must follow best practice and budget adequately to avoid allowing sediment to enter the marine environment," Mr Gifford said.

Report all pollution to the EPA on 131 555.





Bermagui Woolworths? - a move away from community to corporate capitalism in the name of globalisation and growth

An extract from David Arvind Condon's latest film: *We are the earth – what we do to the earth, we do to ourselves.*

Corporate globalisation doesn't know how to explore issues and problems in depth with an attitude of examination in order to achieve real solutions for the local community, the environment and humanity; they only know how to propagate and make money and often in an immoral way.

Large multinational corporations enjoy privileged status granted to them by governments; the growth and profit of large corporations pre-empt local and national interests. The law benefits the corporation at the expense of the people and the environment. This is how it works: corporate bottom line is profit for its directors and shareholders; most of the money is taken out of the local community, through automated checkout. Produce comes cheap, imported and chemically treated (sometimes with proven toxic effects), while our local farmers who produce fresh produce are being displaced by the chemical manufacturers -read the labels and research the chemicals that are being used. The experience of friendly faceto-face shopping, where social contact is nearly as important as the transaction, is an image on which Woolworths have spent millions of dollars of TV advertising. It is a corporate image we have come to know to be as phony as the corporations that pay for those smiles; we are all being falsely conditioned with celebrity culture imagery. Next time you see one of those ads ask the smiley face about something local and imagine what they might say.

By positioning Woolworths in Bermagui, the strip of small independent stores will be displaced by the new traffic/pedestrian flow. This puts them at a disadvantage and what usually happens is that they are forced to close.

A globalisation model works like this – if I cut down a forest, build a logging road, hire labour and transport it to a buyer, I convert a forest to timber, a commodity, and the GDP goes up. Similarly if I can find a traditional society that uses herbs and shamanic techniques for healing, then destroy their culture and make them dependent on pharmaceutical medicine which they must purchase, evict them from their land so they cannot be subsistence farmers and must buy food, clear their land and hire them on a banana or palm oil plantation – I make the world richer. I have brought various functions,

This process is a conversion of social capital, natural capital, cultural capital, and spiritual capital into money. Essentially for the economy to continue growing and for the (interest-based) money system to remain viable, more and more of nature and human relationship must be monetised. For example, thirty years ago most meals were prepared at home; today some two-thirds are prepared outside, in restaurants or supermarket delis. A once unpaid function, cooking, has become a paid 'service'. And we are the richer for it, right?

Corporate globalisation is the process of stripping away these grass roots and greenhouse friendly assets to feed the money machine's insatiable appetite. The continuation of capitalism as we know it depends on an infinite supply of these new industries, which essentially must convert infinite new realms of social, natural, cultural, and spiritual capital into money. The problem is, these resources are finite, and the closer they come to exhaustion, the more painful their extraction becomes. Therefore, contemporaneous with the financial crisis we have an ecological crisis and a health crisis. They are intimately interlinked.

"When plunder becomes a way of life for a group of men in a society, over the course of time they create for themselves a legal system that authorizes it and a moral code that glorifies it".

- Frederic Bastiat, Economist 1801-1850

Capitalism, globalisation, deregulation and western civilisation debt-driven economies have led to a collapse of the financial sector, as we have seen through the global financial crisis in 2008, which is merely a symptom of a systemic crisis of capitalism itself. Capitalism/ globalisation means increased exploitation of workers worldwide, destruction of our forests and the Earth's natural recourses, and a decrease in the standard of living for the average person, which in turn creates civil unrest. This we are seeing more and more throughout the Middle-East and the worldwide Occupy movement - mass demonstrations in the financial districts in over 900 cities. They are protesting social and economic inequality, corporate greed, corporate power and influence over government, united by the desire for global human rights, civil liberties and democratic governance.

There is an idea pushed by governments and corporations that the economy must grow indefinitely, without a recognition that the resources are finite. Sure, you can get away with a certain level of growth, but the net effect is cannibalisation of the very resources that allow the economy to exist in the first place. Anyone who buys into endless growth hype is part of the problem. Now that we understand the consequences of this kind of thinking this attitude is no longer acceptable.

"You can ignore reality, but you can't ignore the consequences of ignoring reality." - Ayn Rand

Free market policies are dominating the world through the exploitation of the environment and impoverishing the people through capitalised globalisation. The result as I see it is catastrophic for all of us.

That's why I am personally against any form of a multinational corporation moving into Bermagui, displacing our local farmers and small independent stores and changing this unique area from our beautiful seaside village into another suburb of soulless consumerism. It is nothing short of environmental, architectural and economic vandalism.

Bermagui Public School Bush Tucker Garden

Our Bush Tucker garden was completed in 2009, with the help of Merryn Carey, Les Kosez and funded by Australian Government Indigenous Co-ordination Centre. We invited the community and had a planting day. Teaching and learning notes were created as well as signage. There are 36 different plants in the garden, including 'Orray' Davidsons Plum, 'Wom-bai' Lemon Myrtle and 'Panaryle' Snowy River Mint.

It helps us to maintain Indigenous culture through community involvement, support new forms of Indigenous Cultural expression and increases public awareness of Indigenous culture.

There are four areas in our school – rainforest, orchard, screening and vegetables.

Native animal sculptures are found throughout the gardens.

Students enjoy exploring and sitting in the gardens at lunch time. The students look forward to trying the tucker and finding out more about the local plants.



Works are beginning at Myer House in Mimosa Rocks

NSW National Parks and Wildlife Service (NPSW) advises that from May 17 visitors to Mimosa Rocks National Park will find one small area off limits and may find increased traffic due to refurbishment works at Myer House.

NPWS Regional Manager for the Far South Coast Tim Shepherd says improvements to Myer House will retain as much of the original building as possible, while bringing it up to standards suitable for holiday accommodation.

"The public are still welcome to come and enjoy the Penders Area and only the land directly around Myer House will be cordoned behind construction fencing," Mr Shepherd said.

"There will be no access restrictions, but visitors may find more traffic on the roadways as tradespeople and construction crews come and go.

"Myer House's plumbing, roofing, guttering, and so forth will be restored and the property will be furnished with sensitivity to maintaining its heritage values.

"Some works are now scheduled to follow further archaeological surveys, but these should be completed by August and we anticipate Myer House will be available for hire by this summer.

"Parks has made no decisions on the future use of the Barn and surrounding area, however we have decided not to proceed with any development at the Thong Camp site.


"In early spring, NPWS will hold a



professionally facilitated planning session to continue working with the public to develop plans for the use of the remainder of the Penders site, including the Barn.

Myer House sits on the former Penders property located northeast of Bega. The property was donated to NPWS in 1976 and was critical to the creation of Mimosa Rocks National Park.

Brrr – winter is here again

Wow, here we are in another season and with so much still to do in the garden before the winter hibernation gets under way.

Winter brings with it a number of many important jobs in the garden and topping the list is the pruning of fruit trees and roses and the winter spraying of these plants to remove insect and fungal pests that think they can over winter on the plants.

The stages of this work is important especially where larger plants are concerned as the last thing we need to do is use excessive amounts of chemical to eradicate the pest. Basically by this I mean that the pruning should be completed before the application of the chemical, thus not wasting chemical on material that will be pruned off.

An important factor to also remember when pruning is to wait until the plants have gone into complete dormancy before the pruning takes place. This will discourage plants to re shoot and new growth be burnt off by a frost.


There are generally two chemicals to use, one for the fungal problems and one for insect problems.

Winter oil or dormant oil is used for the insect problems and lime sulphur for fungal problems.

It is important to use both of these chemicals before there is any sign of the new buds swelling in early spring.

Moving along from your existing fruit and rose plants to some new plants that you might be considering purchasing. Now is the time to do this is you are looking for the most cost effective way to purchase, that being open or bare rooted.

Should you prefer this method of purchasing your plants there are several important things to look out for when making

your selection. Firstly is the plant healthy? Do not purchase any plant that has any shrivelled wood or bark as this indicates that the plant has been allowed to dry out and the plant could fail to regrow when the warmer weather arrives. Check to see that there is not evidence of any pest or disease. Things like scale or fungal disease on the stems or swellings on the root system that could indicate a root borne pest. Lastly, take some hessian or an old blanket with you when you go to the nursery to make your purchase so the roots can be wrapped up to prevent them drying out on the trip home. Either plant them straight away or "heal" them in to some moist loose soil until you are ready to plant.

There are many other tasks that should be

done during this month including the planting of strawberry, rhubarb and asparagus crowns. These are found as bare rooted plants in nurseries until early August. Also the tidying up of late summer and autumn flowering shrubs to encourage early spring growth when the warm weather arrives. Do not prune spring flowering shrubs now as you will be cutting off the growth that carries the flowering wood.

Continue with mulching

of all the garden beds with a suitable mulch to protect the close to surface roots from the extremes of the cold frosts and to discourage early spring weed growth.

One very important factor we often forget about in winter is watering. Plants still dry out in winter whether in pots or in the ground. Although it is not done as often in winter it still needs to be done.

Till next time keep rugged up and enjoy some homemade pumpkin soup from the garden pumpkins of last summer.

Soft Footprint Recipes

Albacore tuna are in local waters now and the Bermagui fish shops are selling it for the same price as most other fish - around \$30 a kilo.

We've had several delicious meals featuring this versatile migrant to our seas. I knew it as sushi and as a smoked entree but I wasn't familiar with ways of cooking it. I checked in a seafood cook book and found that

tuna can be braised, pan-fried or grilled and has an affinity with Mediterranean d i s h e s u s i n g tomatoes, onions, garlic and olives and robust sauces such as pesto and tapenade. I smothered two pieces with homemade pesto and gently panfried them. Very nice.

Then I found a simple recipe for

Tuna Teriyaki. The marinade required sake, mirin and soy sauce. As I only had the last ingredient I substituted gin and sherry for the Japanese basics and was pleased with the result. I suppose that bottled teriyaki sauce could be used instead.

Tuna Teriyaki for Two

2 tuna steaks marinated in a mixture of 3 tablespoons each of gin, white wine or other

liquid, sherry and soy sauce. Turn occasionally for the flavour to penetrate evenly. After an hour cook on a grill or in a pan for 3-5 minutes each side, basting frequently. Serve with rice and salad and the rest of the cooked marinade as a sauce.

Our steaks were too big for one meal and made a wonderful salad next day, flaked and

mixed with leftover rice and justharvested water chestnuts.

Now, the following recipe can hardly fit into the Soft Footprint category but I just have to share it - quick, easy, yummy and decadent - and there are no eggs or even dairy products, unless you use milk

chocolate, so it must be good for you!

Coffee Fruit Cake from CWA Classics, published by Penguin.

1 kg mixed dried fruit (I include apricots, ginger and chopped nuts)

2 cups strong black coffee

150 grams of chopped chocolate, any kind, but I prefer dark, Fairtrade. 2 cups SR flour Pour coffee over dried fruit, stir and leave for several hours or overnight. Combine fruit with chocolate and flour. Place in a greased 20cm x 27cm pan. Bake in a moderately slow (170C) oven for about one and a half hours or until cooked. This cake does not rise much and is more like a rich, dense fruity slice. It is perfect served with coffee, perhaps dusted with a little icing sugar.


