When that is complete and we hand them to council and the DA is approved we are good to go. We have also been fortunate to have been granted \$40 000 recently. We are all Mums and Dads of young families that stand on this committee and we are all full time working, things take time and we all realise that the skate park has been a long time coming, but we are committed to seeing this through.

There is a fund raiser this September 21 put on by Bermagui Cellars and the funds raised will be kindly donated to the Bermagui Skate Park. 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Technology can be a very positive contributor to our evolution as a society and in another field (not so local this time) the Waka Waka social enterprise have created what is in effect a mini power station. Designed as the most efficient LED solar powered light affordable to people living on \$2 a day, the development and startup production was crowd funded. Further development (also crowd funded) saw the Waka Waka light morph into the Waka Waka mini power station that can charge your phone or other small devices as well as provide 16 hours of bright light after a single day of sunlight. It will charge a smart phone in a couple of hours. Or you can use your computer to charge the light.

So far 12 000 lights have been distributed in Haiti and 5 000 of the mini power stations have gone to Syria. But sales are not limited to third world countries, when they are sold into a country like Australia the sale leverages a donation to a third world country. I got mine as part of the start up crowd funding and I love it. You can find out more on the net at wakawaka.com.

Council's actions sheer bloody mindedness!!

The decision to cut down the beautiful gum trees in Littleton Gardens was bad enough, but the actions of Bega Valley Shire Council in proceeding with the decision after clear community feedback shows the nature of this Council.

Council had clear alternatives and could have saught a second opinion but out of sheer bloody mindedness proceeded with cutting down community assets that provided shade and amenity in the Gardens. Worse still they did this with undue haste on a Saturday in order to try and avoid further public outcry.

Council is obsessed with red tape and is the first to come down hard on community members who try to make additions or renovations on their homes. If a community member tried to avoid Council perusal by finishing a job on weekends Council throws the book at them, but here we have a Council that not only made a poor decision but then implemented it on a weekend in order to avoid further public scrutiny.

It just shows why we must never give Councils in this country more power via recognition in our Constitution. It also shows why we need legislation to allow community members to seek urgent injunctions to prevent intransigent and bloody minded councils from proceeding with decisions that are clearly not in the public interest.

Attention Year 6 students and teachers! Year 6 students are invited to design and make model chook tractors for a display at The South Coast Field Days in Bega on Saturday and Sunday 21 and 22 September. Members of the public are also invited to display working chook tractors. Contact Annette on 6493 3400 for more details. What is a chook tractor? (imagine...) It is a mobile cage and house of some sort that protects a few chooks and gives them a comfortable place to live in and lay eggs while they do some garden digging, eating and fertilising. The structure can be easily moved to a new place in your garden every day or two. What it looks like and what extra features it may have are up to you and your imagination. Criteria - the model should fit inside a wheelbarrow - the design features of the chook tractor should be clearly labelled and explained - use of recycled materials is encouraged.



A maximum number of design features are also encouraged e.g. self feeding, self watering, easy egg collection, sun and wind control, predator proofing, ease of shifting etc.

Design certificates and gifts will be awarded. How students can display their model chook tractors at The South Coast Field Days:

1. Ask your teacher or parent to email The Crossing to register your name: thecrossing@ thebegavalley.org.au

2. Complete your model, with labels on design features and attach your full name and school.

3. Deliver your model to Bega Showgrounds on Friday afternoon 20 September between 3.30pm and 4.30pm or between 8.00 and 8.30am on Saturday morning 21 September - look for 'The Crossing Chook Tractors' sign.

All chook tractor models and working chook tractors can be picked up at the end of the field days between 4 and 5pm on Sunday 22 September. Anything left at the showgrounds will be put in the pavilion for Monday pickup at the latest.

The Crossing is a not for profit permaculture designed camp on the Bermagui River that helps young people put sustainability into action. They offer Landcare and sustainability journeys from year 6 to year 12 and tertiary groups. They also offer adult workshops, including an annual Permaculture Design Course with John Champagne.

'In celebration of 125 years of our parish: the early 1900s'

White ants played havoc with church buildings in the Parish. Their gnawing, and the realisation that the building was too small, led to the decision in February 1895 that the church in Tilba needed to be replaced. From then, it was only a little over a year until the building was completed.

People in Quaama also wanted a building in which to worship together and started raising funds for this in 1905. The building was complete by 1907. In Cobargo, the damage the white ants had caused also led to the decision that the Church needed to be replaced. But Cobargo was slower than Quaama (or Tilba) and from the decision being made in 1907, it took some 15 years until it actually happened. The work started, it stopped, ...

In the meantime, in Bermagui, the community erected All Saints which was

dedicated in 1911.

Finally in 1922, Mrs Harris took over as Secretary of the Cobargo Church Building Fund. The foundation stone was laid, the building progressed and within two years it was completed - was it a coincidence that there was a woman at the helm? Am I biased? Perhaps not, at the ceremony for laying the foundation stone, Archdeacon Bryant "referred to the fine work performed by the women of the parish (in getting to this stage), and said it was the turn of the men to help solidly."

And for all of this building, the community raised funds. Dances, concerts, bazaars, sales, and as always, the behaviour of some at these concerts was not seen as appropriate by the standards of the time. At a concert to raise funds for the building in Tilba, the local paper reported that: "The larrikin element was unfortunately strongly in evidence, and about half a dozen hoodlums at times made themselves very objectionable. From what I have heard since, however, I think I may safely say there is hardly likely to be a repetition of such unseemly conduct. Those who made themselves so objectionable are well known, and strong precautionary measures are to be taken to prevent anything of the kind occurring again". One wonders what they did!

Earle Horne, 12.1.1923 – 25.7.2013



Earle Horne – honest, humble, hardworking and generous

At Earle Horne's funeral on Thursday 1 August we heard from his son-in-law Richard that Earle joined the army when World War II broke out, at just 16 years of age. In February 1941 he was sent to Singapore with the 2/18 Division, captured by the Japanese and held in

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Cnr Bermagui Rd and Avernus St, Cobargo 6493 6817 Changi POW camp for two and a half years. He turned 21 in Changi. We heard that he used to break into the guards' supplies to liberate Red Cross stores – food and other provisions. Sometimes cigarettes. Not that he talked about those years much. He contracted Beriberi from malnutrition, and his eyes were never the same.

Earle made it home in 1946, met Joan at the autumn dance that year, and they married in April 1947. They soon bought Merrydale on the eastern outskirts of Quaama village, clearing the land and building a successful dairy farm, later turning to beef. There they brought up five kids: Jennifer, Margaret, Elizabeth, Brett and Debby.

A regular at Bega Races, Earle knew his horses. One day he took Margaret and Elizabeth and backed nine winners straight. The phone would start ringing early on Melbourne Cup Day for Earle's hot tip, and he was usually right.

Always a hard worker, he was still a common sight on his tractor or Gator at 88 years of age.

Earle just hadn't been the same since losing Joan in August 2011, and Debby, suddenly, not much later. He spent the last eight months at Hillgrove House in Bega, where he died on Thursday 25 July, aged 90.

Organic baits for fruit fly

It's September, and the FREE community fruit fly baiting program has started again. The program is funded by the Bega Valley Seed Savers and SCPA ñ South East Producers using the organically certified eco-Naturalure product. The bait is non-toxic to humans but must be freshly applied every week. Volunteers around the area have stepped up to the challenge and are producing new bait cards each week.

"If we help each other, we might have a chance to again eat that luscious, ripe peach straight from the tree. With no maggots!" says John Champagne, SCPA President.

Bega, Bemboka, Tilba, Bermagui, Wolumla, Quaama and Cobargo are all involved.

Those participating will need to return the previous week's cards when they pick up fresh bait cards each week and the volunteers would really appreciate the cards being washed prior to being returned. The cards only last for up to seven days before needing to be returned and replaced. One card protects two fruit trees.

Bermagui residents can collect their cards each Monday at Neilson's Mitre 10,

Bega residents can collect cards from the council offices each Monday afternoon and Tuesdays. For other locations contact: Tilba Tilba - Philip Mawer, 4473 7835; Verona and Quaama - Ray Clements, 6493 8472.

People with fruit trees are encouraged to pick up all fallen fruit and dispose of it by solarising in a well-sealed plastic bag for several weeks before composting. Alternatively small quantities may be boiled, microwaved or frozen to kill insect eggs and larvae before disposal. Placing fruit or fruit scraps into uncovered compost bins or worm farms does not kill fruit fly.

Successfully Selling Citrus

A group of students from Bega TAFE will be selling quality local produce at the South Coast Field Days in September. The students are from a short course called 'Making a Buck from Beetroot'. They come from a variety of age groups and backgrounds and all of them are passionate about growing and preparing quality local produce.

While planning their food preparation unit, the students decided to use citrus, which was plentiful and in season when it was needed. Three 'Sensational Citrus' products were made in one day, under the guidance of a commercial cooking teacher and using the TAFE commercial kitchen. The students all had fun while learning to make Orange Whiskey Marmalade, Indian Lime Pickle and Preserved Lemons.

The preserves and a selection of other citrus inspired products will be available at the South Coast Field Days, held at Bega Showground on September 21 and 22. Proceeds from the sales will be donated to Ricky's Place.

'Making a Buck from Beetroot' has covered all aspects of establishing a sustainable food business. This includes growing food, food safety, business planning, marketing and financial requirements. Throughout the course, there is a focus on understanding that to be

sustainable the business needs to use fewer resources. The course provides the students with a Certificate I – Access to Work and Training.

"With this like-minded group there is a great deal of potential," said Vickie Goldsmith, one of the course facilitators.

"Students are already starting to develop ideas for a business, either on their own or in groups."

One of the students, Emily Stokes is already producing for sale but wanted to do more. Emily says she found the farm tour and commercial kitchen days inspiring.

"They neatly brought together everything

we have been working on in class. After this, I felt very confident that I would be able to start a small scale food business of my own," said Emily.

'Making a Buck from Beetroot' has been funded by Illawarra TAFE (Bega campus) as well as the TAFE Outreach Department. Field Day organisers, South East Producers Association (SCPA) are a partner in the program.

Don't get mad at the bandicoot

If an adult kangaroo or wallaby has received an injury such as a broken leg or back, the animal must be euthanised. They cannot handle being in care for the length of time it would take to heal and would die of stress. It is a much kinder option to euthanise the animal as soon as possible rather than have it die a lingering death. WIRES often calls on our

police to help in these situations. The police, though very busy, always come out as soon as possible and put the animal out of its misery. WIRES is very grateful for this support.

If a joey is found in the pouch, it can be raised and released back into the wild when it has reached the proper age.

Many of our native animals are out and about after dusk foraging for food. So please take extra care when driving from 'dusk to dawn' for your safety and theirs!

Hannah Kent Burial Rites Picador \$32.99

This is a first novel by 26 year old Australian writer, Hannah Kent, who spent time as a teenager in Iceland where she first heard the story of Agnes Magnusdottir. Agnes was condemned to death for her role in the murder of two men in Northern Iceland in 1829. The novel tells of the last months of her life, when she was sent from prison to live with a family to await her execution by beheading, carried out by the brother of one of the murdered men. Attended by a young clergyman, who was sent by the authorities to urge her repentance, Agnes slowly reveals the story of her life and her role

in the events culminating in the brutal murders. The harshness of her childhood, spent in dire poverty, shapes her life and the choices she made, explaining how she became involved with one of the murdered men. Rather than being held in jail, she is placed with a family that initially rejects any human contact with her, but as the winter deepens and she works alongside them to ensure their survival, the relationships change, particularly between Agnes and the wife of the couple. This is a very moving book, based on a true story, and has won great acclaim for this first-time author. It has already been published in over 20 countries, with release in Iceland due soon. Potato and pea herb frittata serves 6 - 8

I've been asked to share writing this column with Carole and Dawn. It's been a bit harder to approach than I realised when I said yes. Where to start? I have always been interested in food - my Chinese grandmother's influence stamped me from an early age. She was always in the kitchen preparing food or in her garden. Apart from her bitter medicinal soups she used to prepare for my grandfather or her use of really weird ingredients like beche de mer - sea cucumbers that would be reconstituting in our laundry tub - I loved every meal she cooked. Her ingenuity and economy were vast. In typical Chinese style there would always be a soup and several dishes for dinner. Always a cooked breakfast and my school sandwiches were the envy of my friends. Nana

was illiterate so there were no recipes in our house. Unfortunately I was too short sighted to really take notice of how she did things. I can remember tastes but many of her dishes are lost in time. How she made her steamed lemon sponge just whipping it up with chopsticks I'll never know. When I left home I couldn't steam rice properly. As a student I suffered eating a lot of gluggy fried rice. When I realised being a teacher was not what I wanted I started working in kitchens. I've had different careers in between cooking, but working with food has been with me for most of my working life. And I have always been an enthusiastic eater and consumer of recipe books and books about food, culture and eating. It's the glue that holds us together.

I moved to the Triangle ten years ago. I sorely missed my multi cultural speciality providores at first and I would be the first one to seek out my favourite dim sum restaurant when I'm in the city, but I am so excited to be able to pick my own lemons, to know where my milk is from, to go to my local organic bulk food store and buy from local growers. The 30 km Taste of the Triangle Community Dinner was a fun and successful showcase for what we can do here with local produce and producers.

I struggled with what to offer as my first recipe and I thought I would give you something you have probably had various recipes for but it was the last thing I made to share.

Ingredients

750 – 1 kg smallish potatoes boiled in their skins till cooked and cold

Large cup of barely cooked peas refreshed in cold water-

I had frozen but fresh peas which are coming in season would be nicest 7 large eggs

300 ml thickened cream or light sour cream

About 3-4 tbsp of finely chopped herbs – eg parsley, dill, chives, chervil $\frac{1}{4}$ cup finely grated parmesan, handful of shredded parmesan for the top Salt and pepper

Method

Preheat oven 180 degrees C.

Line a 28cm removable base flan tin with baking paper.

Peel and slice potatoes into 5mm pieces.

Place pieces of potato into tin strewing the peas about in between.

Whisk eggs, cream, salt, pepper, grated parmesan and herbs together.

Pour over other ingredients until covered. Scatter shredded parmesan for scattering on top

Cook for about 40 mins. Can be served hot or cold.
