Too young to accept the offer at that time, Jacob has had to wait twelve months. However, this has given him and his supporters, the Bermagui Lions Club, time to fundraise to cover the expenses of his European schooling. Bermagui Lions Club is assisting Jacob in his endeavours with a series of fundraising events, which I am sure the Triangle and far south communities will be proud to support.

At this stage Jacob knows he will be studying somewhere in France, and will find out who his host family is only in the month before he travels.

On the morning of the Seaside Fair,

ABC Open South East NSW was 'live on air' from the fair. I approached ABC producer Vanessa Milton to interview Jacob and me for their programme about how strangers meet, but in particular to hear Jacob's story about his quest to step outside his comfort

zone and pursue the dream of foreign education, and to give a plug for his sponsorship with the Lions Club. This led to Vanessa Milton's decision to include the story in "Portrait of a Stranger".

English fun with French

It's 9.30am on Monday morning, at the beginning of the new term, and I'm standing at the door to the Year 3 classroom at Cobargo Public School.

"Could Alice* please come for reading?" I ask Mrs Martin.
Mrs Martin glances over at Alice, who's sitting in the back
row, looking worried. There follows a few minutes of whispered
negotiations between teacher and student, before Alice agrees
to go with me to the room we use for MULTILIT.

MULTILIT (Making Up Lost Time In LITeracy) is a programme devised by Macquarie University for students who need to catch up to their age reading level. Research has shown that most students taught by MULTILIT methods make extraordinary gains in literacy skills in a short period of time.

Students in our programme spend 30 minutes working one-on-one with a YESS reading tutor 3-4 times a week. Volunteers in the local YESS initiative (Youth Educational Support Service) have been tutoring students at Narooma High and Cobargo and Bermagui Primary schools for the past eight months or so. I, for one, find it very satisfying to see the kids improve, and to see their relief and their sense of achievement as the letters on the page start to make sense. Yes, they *can* read!

YESS volunteers spend up to $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours one day a week with children at Narooma High, Cobargo Public or Bermagui Public schools. Some are retired, some are parents or grandparents, some are just community members who like to help kids with reading.

It's two weeks later and I'm standing at the door of Year 3 again. Alice spots me and she's up and out the door before I even knock, chatting about her weekend as we make our way to the reading room. Her reading is improving already and she knows it, and what's more she's enjoying it. And that's what brings me back, week after week.

Akolele clean-up day record

Akolele residents think they might have set a volunteering record when 12 of them weighed in to help on Clean Up Australia Day on March 6.

"It was the first time Akolele has taken part in Clean Up Australia, and it was a really strong start," site supervisor David Kelly said.

"This is a tiny community. There are only about 50 permanent residents, and we have about that many homes in total, so getting 12 volunteers out for Clean Up Australia was a terrific effort," he said.

"We had nearly a quarter of the population out cleaning up. If it was Bermagui, that would be about 500 people, and if it was Narooma you'd be talking thousands," he said.

David added that the Akolele crew was surprised at how much rubbish they found.

"We thought we had a pretty clean shared back yard along the lake shore. Most of us pick up rubbish as we go for a walk, and Coastcare co-ordinator Robyn Levey in particular really makes an effort and has a regular rubbish collection routine."

But the team filled quite a few bags

Getting the lowdown on zero emissions

Local volunteer groups Transition Town Triangle Plus (TTT+) and Clean Energy for Eternity (CEFE) have arranged for a presentation by Geoff Cameron from Beyond Zero Emissions (BZE) of the inspiring and ground breaking plan for a comprehensive overhaul of the power supply in Australia.Geoff says "There is a new alternative to coal, gas and nuclear for powering Australia which is affordable,



reliable and available today".

The BZE group has prepared a plan of action to transform our energy systems to these renewable technologies in just ten years. This is the "can do" campaign for a safer and more sustainable future for our country and our planet."The Zero Carbon Australia Plan deals only with stationary energy, that is power production and

changes required to the transmission through the grid to the consumer. Future plans will cover emissions from transport, buildings, industrial processes and land use with the aim of achieving zero or negative greenhouse emissions in every sector.

The presentation will be held at the Bermagui Country Club on Saturday 9th April from 5.30pm till 7.30pm after which there is the option of moving to the Terrace Restaurant and discussing the event over dinner. We hope that this will be a family friendly event and our main speaker, Geoff Cameron, will be backed by

local community members who will form a panel for a Q & A participatory discussion. While the topics of discussion will depend on the audience they are likely to include items such as:

Job creation in a renewable energy world?

Can renewable energy support manufacturing in Australia?

Can renewable energy meet the demand for electricity?

Zero Emissions - is it acheivable? What happens if we don't do anything? Power transmission challenges.

The technologies included in the plan, namely: wind power, concentrating solar thermal with salt storage (CST), small scale solar, hydroelectric generation, biomass back-up.

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

He then went to England for three years

Bermagui is a funny place... tourists who pass through without knowing it must think what I think about a lot of the little villages we've passed through in rural Mexico... even Chiapas and Oaxaca.... 'it's very pretty, but what the hell do the people do around here'?

That is the secret of the small town. The community. It doesn't matter what you do. Walk down the street, go to the supermarket, pick up the mail, it's always a social thing. Of course Bermi also has the lovely Gulaga mountain scene, bush and sparkly beaches, clean air and clean public facilities! That is a healthy environment. The only problem with Bermagui is that, of the 2000- ish people living here, mostly retired, the young population lack economic and career opportunities which prevents a lot of them from staying after high school.

Mexico those young people would be walking up and down the beach in high season, selling sarongs, jewellery... chewing gum.

Performing circus acts on the street corner, selling bags of fish to passing cars... or begging in front of the news agency. Worlds apart we are, due to a social security system, some young people in Bermi surf or drink, or smoke all day. Maybe in one way social security is a great benefit allowing people to study and receive benefits, be a single mother or father and care for children who have intellectual disabilities and still participate in society, be they an old age pensioner after working for years...but in another way maybe it is socially immobilising.

Travelling really teaches you about the world and yourself. Its easy to feel intimidated by Mexico and it's

Now if Bermi was a village in community systems. I see all the Mexicans, getting out there, doing whatever they can.. playing a tiny guitar with 2 strings, donning a clown nose and juggling in the middle of the avenue, children singing you nursery rhymes for

> Here we are with so many skills, educated, experienced and immobilised by a false sense of security and self doubt. As if we have a 'choice' about what to do. After seeing so many people around Mexico, who have NO choice I disgust myself with my first world, everything taken for granted, indulging in the security and comfort that Australian life offers.

> We could all take a leaf out of a third world country peoples book. Of course when you get home you forget all of this... coz you were actually only on holidays.

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





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Book Review

Jonathan Franzen, Freedom, Fourth Estate, \$32.99

This book has been eagerly awaited by all those who loved Franzen's first novel, The Corrections - and if you're one in that category, you won't be disappointed. Be aware though that you'll need to put aside a big block of time - it's not that easy to get into, but once there, you'll hardly be able to put it down. Like John Updike (to whom Franzen is now being compared), the author paints an enormous canvas - middle America at the time of 9/11 and the invasion of Iraq, the destruction of natural habitat, out-ofconsumerism and deep disaffection with big business and

government. The story revolves around one family - and you won't immediately warm to any of the characters, but somehow he manages to make you care about what happens to them. Family dysfunction and long held animosities dominate their stories, but told with great empathy and indeed humour; some of the comic descriptions are amongst the best you'll read. And you

have to sympathize with Walter, the faithful husband and father who attempts to hold the family and his life-long friendship with an ageing rock star together, while at the same time, working

with big coal industry to try to save the planet.

Franzen recently appeared on the cover of Time magazine and is hailed by some as taking over the mantle of the passing generation of American authors - big shoes to fill, but if *Freedom* is any thing to go by, he's well on the way. At the same time as reading this, I read Phillip Roth's latest book, Nemesis

- a huge disappointment from my just about all-time favourite author, made more so by the fact that the last 40 or so pages were vintage Roth - most frustrating!

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

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Soft Footprint Recipes

Anzac Day is just a few weeks away and rosemary, the herb of remembrance, is closely linked with it. Rosemary is a classic herb for roast lamb, but its strong flavour and scent can be overdone - sprigs inserted under the fat or baked next to the joint will be enough. Likewise, a branch dipped in olive oil, used as a brush to baste grilled meat or prawns, will impart sufficient flavour.

A year ago I gave you a recipe for a herb and lemon cake, using rosemary or lavender leaves. Here's an unlikely cake recipe using beetroot that's been given to me by Jenny Lord of Cobargo. Like pumpkin, carrot and zucchini, beetroot makes a moist cake that keeps well and is suitable for freezing. And it's a beautiful colour! I made my mixture into cupcakes and iced them with lemon icing.

Beetroot Cake

250 gm butter 1 cup sugar 4 eggs 250 gm peeled, finely chopped or grated fresh beetroot

1 cup currants

2 teaspoons grated lemon rind

1 tablespoon lemon juice half a teaspoon ground nutmeg

April in the Garden

If you can make your way through the jungle, after all our autumn rain, get busy in the veggie garden!

You still have time to get your winter veggies in but it is getting late, especially for those of us in the frosty regions.

Plant brassica seedlings (Cauli's, broccoli, cabbage etc) now, it is too late for seed, as these crops really need to be a decent size before the soil temperature cools down. Keep an eye out for cabbage moths as their caterpillars can decimate a crop in a matter of days, a preventative dusting of derris, or a spray of Success/Dipel will do the trick. The good news is as soon as the weather cools down the moths will disappear till spring.

Now is also a good time to plant English spinach, broad beans and if you aren't too frosty, peas.

Garlic is a fabulous crop to grow and very easy, as a general rule of

thumb, plant in our area around Anzac Day and you will be harvesting before Christmas. Don't bother trying to grow plants from supermarket garlic as most of it is imported and treated not to sprout (another good reason to grow your own). Buy locally grown garlic and divide up the cloves, plant straight away in good soil that drains well, mulch and feed with an organic fertilizer and harvest in late spring/early summer when the leaves start yellowing off.

Think now about ordering bare root plants from your nursery for winter delivery; ornamentals, fruit trees and roses are all available this way and are a great way to get good size plants.

Be vigilant with weeds,

there are so many after the rain! Remember the old adage "one years seeds is seven year weeds"
