Built on a sloping clay surface, the bitumen was sprayed like a mere lick of paint. The drainage was inadequate, with water channeled into

the Co-op and a lake forming on the bitumen near the co-op entrance. A truck entering the car park from the highway just sank, gouging the recently sealed surface. Newly laid guttering and the two entrances had to be dug up and replaced with blue stone, drainage, new gutters and another spray of bitumen.

The fragility of a country town

During the middle week of January, just as many were emerging from the fog of summer holidays, Cobargo was abuzz with the news that their GP was retiring. As the news filtered out, the phones ran hot with everyone wondering if the GP would be replaced and what would happen if Cobargo could not attract another doctor.

The need for a GP, especially with many older people and young families in the town and outlying areas, was obviously the primary concern. The single-doctor practice in Bermagui certainly could not fill the void.

The second real concern was the effect on the town. Would the pharmacy survive without a doctor? Currently Medicare will not issue a licence for a pharmacy in a town of less than 2000 people. If we lose the chemist we will not get another.

The flow-on would continue. If it were necessary to travel for a GP and chemist to Narooma or Bega, then inevitably there would be a loss of trade

felt in other Cobargo businesses. Naturally, the Cobargo Co-operative, which owns the building, is committed to its continued use as a doctor's surgery.

Early in the week the Southern General Practice Network (SGPN) was contacted to ascertain the assistance this organization could give.

The SGPN is a Federally-funded network of general practice whose role is to support GPs and their practice staff by assisting with recruitment, training and practice management.

On Friday 21st January the SGPN convened a meeting in Cobargo with the CEO of the Division and Dr Lee to discuss the continuity of the Practice. By Monday 23rd the Division's Workforce Officer, Ms Sue Berry reported to *The Triangle* that negotiations were under way and a couple of options were being considered. Ms Berry said, "We are working with Dr Lee and are confident that a solution

will be found", and Cobargo will continue to have the services of a GP.

This issue, although close to a solution, has brought home the financial fragility of small towns. Support for local businesses makes sense in a world of ever-increasing fuel prices, and flood or drought affected food prices.

Cobargo has always been a "working town," achieving much with its strong sense of community.

Let's keep improving services locally and keep our town developing – slowly - just the way we like it.

Bike tracks needed

Copy of letter sent to Bega Valley Council

Dear Sir,

We, the undersigned, are a group of Bermagui and district residents who regularly cycle around the town.

Several of us wrote to you on 22 March 2009 requesting that Council consider planning, building and maintaining additional bicycle tracks (shared pathways) in and around the town to encourage the increased - and safe - use of bicycles by residents and visitors alike for both recreational exercise and to access shops, school, library, sporting clubs and the like.

We pointed out that people use bicycles only when they feel safe to do so and that sharing the road with large cars, many towing big boats or caravans can be a frightening experience.

Another factor which discourages bicycle riding locally is the attitude of some - a minority - of drivers towards cyclists. (Cadel Evans, Australia's ex world road racing champion wrote in 2009 that, in his experience, Australian motorists are the least considerate of cyclists of any in the world.)

We are particularly concerned about bicycle safety between the Bermagui harbour and the Bermagui road bridge. The road here is narrow and carries a lot of traffic, including large trailer boats and caravans.

Could Council please urgently construct a shared pathway for bicycles and pedestrians between and roughly parallel to the river and the road from the harbour to the bridge?

in the cafe. I don't like mud!!


What about the pool Nannie, you like a swim with me?

wonderful view over the bay. We hear the drone of the helicopter and see it heading south and the conversation turns to helicopter rides both had and desired. Twenty minutes later we hear it return, low this time, and watch as it heads towards and lands on the oval. At the behest of a couple of Triangle members I head over, camera and notebook in hand.

Watched by people standing on pavement seats in the street and others turned from their activities the red and yellow Westpac Life Rescue helicopter finally comes to a complete stand still. Harley, the younger member of the crew, came to the fence to assure the Life Guard from Bermagui's beach that they had not

missed a catastrophe – the helicopter was looking for an emergency beacon that had gone off. They had followed the

signal to Bermagui and thought it was one that had accidentally gone off in a house or a boat. A bit like the time they arrived at a house where a beacon had gone off because its battery had failed – after ten years! "Do you have a boat?" this beacon owner was asked. "No, I just picked it up at a garage sale."

As families gathered around the helicopter, peering inside, fascinated and thrilled to get a close look at such a gorgeous beast, Harley drove with the police to the marina to find the errant emergency beacon and its owner.

Bermagui Marine Rescue update

While activity on the lifeboat James T. Lees has been quiet other things have been happening. John Perry our former Unit Commander has resigned from that position. The new Unit Commander is Alec Percival . John Perry has accepted a career opportunity in New Zealand but will stay on as a skipper when in Bermagui. The Unit is very happy to have signed up Keith Appleby as a skipper. Keith is well known around Bermagui as a very experienced charter boat operator. Keith is fully qualified and an excellent boat handler. The Unit is hoping to benefit greatly from his maritime skills and experience. Due to a great dearth of skippers at about the time of John Perry's unavailability, Steve Angelo and Denise Page bit the bullet and signed up to do the TAFE Master 5 course at Moruya. This was a six week, six day a week course and Steve and Denise agreed that they found it fairly gruelling. However, both have passed and are now listed as skippers with

Marine Rescue. Both agree that while they learned a lot they still have a lot to learn.

Also of note to recreational boaters is the fact that Marine Rescue has now put in place a new system known as 'CompassNet". It replaces the old offshore tracking sheet system and can be used for normal log-ins. It is a fully computerised system into which information about destinations and expected times of arrival are placed. The information is provided through the system to the destination points. The destination point receives a flashing on screen notification of vessels that are their responsibility. CompassNet retains information from a vessel once logged on and details are readily called up by other radio operators on other occasions. CompassNet membership is \$50 per year but will also offers members services, events and competitions and the aim is to make it cost neutral to the member

depending on services used.

On a more serious note the Bermagui Unit is considering reducing the level of the current 7 day 24 hour service due to a lack of radio operators resulting from people moving on. Readers are encouraged to consider joining this great volunteer group. All training and uniform is provided. Members in radio signal accessible locations can provide the radio service from home. This is ideal for anyone housebound for any reason who would like to become involved in volunteer radio work. New members are also welcome to continue on the crew and skipper training. Their efforts to obtain unpaid rates also appear to be increasingly draconian. A Melbourne based owner of a small acreage along Ridge Rd recently suffered an illness necessitating a long spell in hospital and missed two quarterly rate payments. On returning home he was sorting out the accumulated paperwork, when a loud knock on the door announced the arrival of a debt collector acting on behalf of you know who. Despite explaining his very valid reason for late payment and paying interest, he was still slugged a \$400 debt service fee, more than the money owing. One would think that a previous 20 year record of timely payments would warrant some attempt by council to find out why the fees were late. A phone call to his wife could have sorted out the problem.



New look for the Quaama School of Arts Hall

If you have driven through Quaama anytime over the last month, you will probably have noticed that the Quaama School of Arts Hall is looking very glamorous and much "younger" now that it has a brand spanking new red colorbond roof. This work was completed in early

December 2010 and is just part of the ambitious "make-over" that its management committee has been undertaking throughout 2010 and which will continue in the early part of this year.

The next step will be to install a new fully commercial kitchen. The old kitchen is to be fully removed, the space madeover with new walls, floors and ceiling, a plumbing upgrade, and fitted out with commercial grade stainless steel benches and food preparation areas, storage space and shelving.

After that it will be time to rewire the Hall, and eventually repaint inside and out.



Seeking Sculptors

Open Letter to sculptors intending to exhibit on Endeavour Point Headland during Bermagui's Sculpture on the Edge 2011

Four cultural heritage sites have been identified on Endeavour Point Headland and under legislation passed in October 2010 Bega Valley Shire Council is committed to protecting these sites from knowing damage.

The Sculpture on the Edge Committee applauds and supports Council's endeavours and ask that intending exhibitors co - operate by giving full details of how they intend to install their works (levelling, post -hole digging, staking, pinning, fencing etc.)

All applications are due on February 4th and must include these details. On February 8th all applications will be considered by the National Parks and Wildlife Service, and sites will be allocated according to the degree of ground disturbance which might be expected. Artists are advised to use the site map in their Artists Guidelines to nominate their preferred site. As before, sites will be allocated on a first come, first serve basis, but if site disturbance is required, chosen sites may not be approved by NPWS to comply with the heritage protection of the Headland.

In the past, levelling of sites has been achieved by cut and fill earthworks. We now propose to level sites by fill only. A supply of a compactable earth fill will be available to achieve this.

All exhibitors are assured that they will be assisted by Sculpture on the Edge volunteers to achieve the best possible placement for their work.

Let's make this a real celebration of a truly unique site.

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

All Potting Mixes are not created equal!

At some stage in your gardening life you will want to grow plants in containers. My best advice is to buy the

wanting to improve their soils or give their newly planted seedlings a head start by planting them in a handful of potting mix.



If you are potting into a very large pot or container you can add up to 20% good garden soil to your good quality potting mix to keep costs

down a bit, but avoid soil in smaller pots as it can create havoc with drainage when it continually dries out and is rewet, You can also add well composted animal manures to potting mixes but just be aware the more organic matter in the mix the more it will "slump" and drop in the pot as it breaks down and will require regular repotting or topping up.

Finally, be aware of drainage when gardening in pots. Always "crock" the pot, this means adding aggregate in the form of broken pottery, gravel crushed tiles etc to the bottom of the pot before adding potting mix, to avoid drainage holes being blocked.

best potting mix you can afford.

Most potting mixes are based on composted pinebark and the cheap and nasty generic ones are just that ...nasty. Often you will find large chunks of pinebark that haven't broken down yet, and this is a disaster for your plants. Nitrogen is needed to continue the breakdown process and it will be "robbed" from the mix leaving your plants to starve, the result being pale unhealthy plants with yellowing leaves. The best potting mixes are based on peat or coir peat (coconut fibre), as these mediums hold onto nutrients and moisture while still allowing good drainage.

NEVER use potting mixes as soil improvers. I get a lot of customers


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Soft Footprint Recipies

The garden, in February, is bursting with cucumbers, beans, beetroot, tomatoes, basil and new potatoes, and corn is coming. There are so many ways to prepare the iconic summer vegetables, and it's exciting to try Middle Eastern or Asian recipes for a change. There are, for example, many delicious ways with fresh or roasted beetroot in salads that do not include



the great Australian standby found in tins.

Our beans are mostly eaten steamed with a drizzle of olive oil, and slivered almonds are a nice addition. I've put the cucumber glut to good use making many jars of bread and butter pickles which will keep all year.

Bread and Butter Pickles

2 kg cucumbers peeled or unpeeled and sliced finely3 medium onions sliced1 green pepper sliced (optional)2 cloves garlic, whole, in muslin bag (optional)

Put the sliced vegetables in a large bowl and pour over a brine made from about 2 tablespoons salt in 2 cups water. Let stand for 3 hours then drain and rinse. Boil together 2 and a half cups cider vinegar with the same quantity of sugar, 1 tablespoon mustard seeds, 1 teaspoon tumeric and the garlic if desired. Remove garlic. Mix liquid with the drained vegetables and bottle. I use Fowler's jars and process in a hot water bath at 92 deg.C ensuring a safe vacuum seal.

Beetroot can be processed in the same way. I partially cook whole beetroot so that the skin slips off easily, then slice them into jars. The pickling liquid to cover 5 or 6 large beetroot is a tangy mixture of 1 and a half cups white vinegar, 3 quarters of a cup of water and the same of sugar, half a teaspoon each of peppercorns, cloves, mustard seeds and salt, a bay leaf and half a cinnamon stick.


Book Review

Heather O'Connor

Howard Jacobson, *The Finkler Question*. Bloomsbury, \$32.99

This book is the winner of the 2010 Booker Prize, and for the first time in a few years, I agree with the judges (bet they're glad to hear that!) The novel deals with the recent rise of anti-Semitism in the UK and the links to the treatment of

the Palestinians by Israel. The central character, Julian Treslove, is not Jewish, but believes that a street mugging he suffered (by a Jew-hating woman) was a case of mistaken identity, after which he starts to identify himself as a Jew - or as he puts it, as a Finkler - named after his friend, an ASHamed Jewish philosopher, Sam Finkler. The third friend of these two is an old Jewish recently widowed, great uncle to a wonderful character called Hephzibah with



serious issues of love, loss, identity, failed relationships, religion and international relations, at times, with extraordinary black humour. The descriptions of Hephzibah in the kitchen, for example, are gems, as are

the long discussions on the merits or otherwise of circumcision.

Treslove is fascinated by the ambiguity shown by his two friends to their Jewishness, and the more he tries to become a Finkler himself, the more complicated he realizes are the issues facing Jews in modern, secular society. It's not often that you find in the one book inconsolable sadness, incredible challenging ideas, but

they are all here in spades. A definite "must read".
