# Vale Aunty Eileen

COBARGO BERMAGUI TILBA & LOCALITIES

Mrs Eileen Mary Morgan died on 21st January, 2011 aged 88. Her funeral was on 28th January at the Anglican Church in Cobargo and the ceremony continued at the Cobargo Cemetery.

Eileen Morgan wrote the book The Calling of the Spirits, published in 1994. With due respect to Eileen's family, I would like to share some of my impressions of her book, which I found of great value not only as a recognised source of reference at the University and the National Archives of Australia but because it is Eileen's own biography, her story in her own words that allows the reader to understand a little of what it was like to live in the Triangle as a First Australian. Eileen was a proud and respected elder of the Yuin tribe of Wallaga Lake, who moved with her husband to Cobargo in 1950. Aptly and not without humour, Eileen describes the experience of being one of the first families to move to Cobargo from Wallaga Lake mission as part of the assimilation policy. There are great stories of growing up around Wallaga Lake, her community, bush tucker and the stories of her elders ("the Old-timers"). There are the memories of the mission managers such as Mr Sampey who posed as the schoolteacher for a while. In Culture Days are photographs of Eileen looking for wild cherries with her great-grand children

and another where she shows them the grass used for making baskets.

I feel privileged Eileen left this book for all to read, a book she started December 1977 after her husband passed away. In the foreword, How I came to write this book, Eileen mentions that it was inspired by one of her great-grandchildren, Aaron Norris, who always liked listening to her stories and kept asking her questions. She explains that she wanted to leave the culture and the legends of their ancestors for the younger generations.

I think everyone in the Triangle is privileged to be able to read these stories. Anyone living in Cobargo who would like a better understanding of their history should read the chapter *Guineapigs in Cobargo* and everyone who enjoys seeing Mount Gulaga would benefit in their experience of calling this area home by reading *Easter on Gulaga Mountain* (pages 163-164 in the chapter called *This Beautiful Light*).

Thank you, Eileen, for also leaving your stories for me to read - someone who has lived here only 17

The newly formed Akolele Coastcare group met with the Eurobodalla weed contractors in November to identify the weed pockets on the northern end of Wallaga Lake. The larger areas of creeping groundsel, mother-of-millions, crassula, blackberry and lantana will be sprayed in an eradication program by the contractors. During the December, January and February meetings the group concentrated on clearing an area

# International Women's Day - Celebrating 100 years

International Women's Day, held each year on the 8<sup>th</sup> March, is an occasion that is marked by women in 69 countries around the world. It is a day when women are recognized for their achievements, can look back on past struggles and, more importantly, look ahead to the untapped potential and opportunities that await future generations of women.

The origin of International Women's Day is one steeped in the history of women's age old struggles to participate in society on an equal footing with men. During the turn of the century, thousands of women and girls, some as young at 10, were employed in factories, working long hours in sweat shop

conditions for less than half the wages paid to men. In 1908, women and girls working in the garment industry in New York held a massive protest rally to demand equal pay for equal work, the end to child labour, and the right to vote. These protesters were met with a police force determined to stop them. The rally became violent as mounted police charged, leaving many women dead and injured.

As a recognition of this, and subsequent events involving women workers, in 1910 at the 2<sup>nd</sup> International Conference of Working Women, it was proposed that each year, in every country, these events would be commemorated as International Women's Day.

Australia has a long history of involvement with women's issues. In the early 1960's, the emergence of feminism swept the world, and, like it or not, those

early "bra burning feminists" changed the course of history for Australian women as they raised

awareness of the inequalities in our society, and presented a log of claims to government, including paid maternity leave, which has only taken some 40 years to become a reality!

We have come a long way since the days when, for example, in the 1930's married women were barred from the workforce. Some may say we have achieved it all – we are liberated, we are equal. But, the reality is that many

ur women are not enjoying the freedoms of

women are not enjoying the freedoms of others. Women are still by far the majority of victims of domestic violence. Statistics tell us that one in every four women in Australia will experience domestic violence at some time in their lives, with an average of 74 women being murdered by intimate partners annually. Many young girls are the silent victims of sexual abuse by male members of their families. And, by far, women are the main targets for rape, with men defending themselves

by saying "they asked for it".

But, by and large, Australian women are free to follow whatever path in life they choose, but not so of our sisters in some other countries where baby girls are unwelcome and often killed at birth, where young girls are sold into prostitution by impoverished families, where girls as young as 7 are genitally mutilated in the name of 'chastity", where women are second class citizens, forced into arranged marriages and generally denied any semblance of equality with men.

This year marks the 100<sup>th</sup> anniversary of International Women's Day – so women of the Triangle – enjoy your special day, be

proud of the achievements Australian women have won, but spare some thoughts for the plight of hundreds of thousands of women across the world who still live miserable lives just because they are women.

# Bermagui Lions farewell one of their own

A quietly spoken man, his

services to the community, were legendary. When Barry volunteered to do a project he could always be relied to see of through. Such was his commitment to what ever he took on.

The members of the Lions club will remember him as a great raconteur for his jokes and humour. One could say he was the backbone on the Lions Club.

# **Editorial**



# Cobargo Show - rain did'nt dampen our day!



# Roger McDonald, When Colts Ran, Vintage Books, \$32.95.

If you like sweeping family sagas that span generations of Australians across the decades from the 1930s, you'll



enjoy this. Many of the themes mateship, the challenges of outback farming, the disruption of war, tension between domesticity and the independence of the men,

the horror of drought, the presence of eccentric loners and men of vision sweep across six decades of Australian life. The book has been hailed as up there with Carpentaria (Alexis Wright) and The Tree of Man (Patrick White). For me, the hectic beginning with so many characters (not very well drawn initially), made it hard going - I think it's one to which you need to devote a block of time in order to work out who's who and begin to relate to their individual stories. It is obviously an important work by this well known author and one that is attracting a lot of attention - I think I'll come back to it later in the year - perhaps my lack of enthusiasm has something to do with the sort of "summer reading" I'd rather do on the beach!

By far the most interesting book

I've read over the break was the autobiography of Australia's leading song writer and singer, Paul Kelly (How to Make Gravy). At \$50.00 its an investment, but I think I've opened it most days for the past month - as a model of biographical writing, it's fascinating; as a history of popular music, it's a great reference, but most of all, it provides the most amazing story of the influences on Kelly's life as an artist and a poet - and anyone who can write about Shakespeare, the last songs of Rickard Strauss, Shane Warne and Donald Bradman, the Bible and Proust, the poems of Thomas Hardy, the importance of Frank Sinatra and the Beatles, and other influences too numerous to mention, deserves to be taken very seriously! A must for anyone interested in popular culture, regardless of whether you like Kelly's music.

Po took it upon herself to guard the area around our house, probably about 2 acres, from goannas. This particularly benefitted the chooks and many other birds such as the Azure Kingfishers which live and nest in trees around the house. Either the Kingfishers, chooks, Magpies or Magpie Larks would sound the alarm and off Po would dash to chase the goannas back into the bush. Our property backs onto National Park, but Po was very nervous about wandering far from the house or her human family after being swooped upon by Wedge Tailed Eagles, and the cattle don't tolerate dogs well without people accompanying them, so she just didn't tend to wander and left other creatures alone. She was always by our side though, when we tended the horses and

cattle, picking fireweed, just doing the normal farm duties.A constant companion to my children and myself.

Po died, enroute to the vet, an agonizing death, undoubtedly, says the vet from the symptoms we describe, from 1080 (Ten Eighty) poisoning. Just a lick of it is likely to kill a dog Po's size and start to take effect in 10-20 minutes, says the vet. There is no antidote.

I've heard people say that their dogs have been poisoned by 1080 enclosed in their house yards, and frankly I haven't believed them, thinking that their dogs probably have been into places like National Parks where they shouldn't, or the dogs have been deliberately baited.

But now, it has happened to us. Somehow 1080 poison is around our house. Po was at home, playing with the children inside and outside the house, then frantically racing around in

terror, desperately seeking solace from my distraught children.

How did the poison get onto our property? Has it been carried by birds, goannas or foxes? Are the remains of an animal that has died of 1080 poisoning on our place and Po has had a sample of the carcass?

I have been oblivious to the effects of 1080 poison, thinking the "authorities" are doing the right thing, targeting specific feral animals for the sake and good of our native species. But I have been so wrong. 1080 kills indiscriminately.

Even as I write this, the Azure Kingfishers have sent out their short, sharp shrieking alert. But Po isn't here now to dash off and muster up that deep growl that belies her size to keep those dragons at bay.



Rain, rain and more rain! The ground is saturated, and while this is a good thing in some respects, the accompanying humidity is hard on those things in the garden that are subject to moulds and mildews. Brown rot is prevalent on fruit trees like plums and peaches. The wet ground is making plants like bamboo, palms and cannas very happy; these are making strong and rapid growth. It is an opportunity to make changes if you have waterlogged areas; perhaps you should replace plants that are

unsuitable with something that doesn't mind getting its feet wet.

The lawn mowers are getting a good workout, but what to do with the lawn clippings? One idea is to use it as mulch in garden beds. It can introduce weed seeds, but if the grass is cut before it seeds this should not be a problem. Spread the clippings evenly and not thick so that it doesn't form a gooey mass. Keep it well away from the trunks of trees and shrubs as it can create conditions ideal for the collar rot fungus phytopthera.

Another approach to deal with grass clippings is to incorporate them into a compost heap. It is best to put down a layer of coarse material like shredded prunings and then a layer of clippings, a layer of manure if you have it, if not, shredded paper would be good. After each couple of layers are put down, a generous application of blood and bone and some ground limestone will help the composting process along. If it is not raining the heap should be kept moist. The compost will become quite hot and after a week or two it should be turned over. I use a heap directly on the ground and turn it with a fork ensuring that it is composted evenly.

When the compost has cooled and is of a nice, sweet smelling consistency it is ready for use. Compost can be added to vegie beds or incorporated into potting mix; plants and worms love it.

Check your roses, they may benefit from an application of fertiliser or blood and bone to keep them growing. When dead heading or cutting flowers, cut back heavily and they

should make a good autumn flush.

The large citrus bugs are active and can do quite a bit of damage to tender new growth. They can be sprayed with an insecticide or an alternative is to put on heavy gloves and catch and squash them. Eye protection is a good idea, they spray nasty stuff and if it gets in your eyes can be very painful.

Any time of year is a good time to apply a thick layer of mulch to your garden beds, the benefits are many. As mulch breaks down, it makes nutrients available, thus feeding your plants. Mulch suppresses weed growth, conserves moisture (hardly a consideration at the moment!) and can provide a run for feeder roots above waterlogged soil. Remember, it must be thick and is best kept topped up, perhaps once each year.

Keep toiling, the rewards are many, for both the body and soul.

Hello everyone,

With all the rain sorrel is in plentiful supply and the Tilba market is a good source for local fruit, vegetables and home made products. Go early and have breakfast in town.

I have been experimenting and reading about this vegetable and have a few recipes to share...Maggie Beer writes of its piquant, lemony flavour and has many uses for this plant. I found a very easy one for fish or mashed potatoes,

Sorrel butter: 250 gms of softened butter, a good handful of parsley and sorrel and the tops of a couple of spring onions all chopped finely and beaten into the butter. Lay a piece of cling wrap out and place heaped teaspoons of the butter at intervals along the wrap, place another piece of wrap over and press down flattening them out like pennies, then freeze.

Place them frozen onto the grilled fish, BBQ'd chicken or potatoes when needed.

Sorrel can also be used with tomatoes, onion and capers as a casserole base for veal, fish and chicken.

I tried a sorrel omelet the other night and it was lovely.

Sorrel Omelet: per person, use

three eggs, half a dozen sorrel leaves, half an onion and one anchovy fillet very finely chopped. Place in a pan with a 1/4 cup of cream or lite evaporated milk (for all of us with a cholesterol problem) a dessert spoon of wine vinegar and simmer a few minutes till the sorrel is soft. It goes a browny colour!

Beat the eggs add salt and pepper, pour into a non stick pan and move the egg to the centre until the bottom has set. Chop a good handful of parsley and place on the omelet then strain the sorrel mixture and place on half the omelet, fold the other side over and serve with a crisp salad. Delicious!

### Caramelized onion, pumpkin and fetta cheese pizza topping.

6 red onions thinly sliced, 1 cup of beer, 1/2 cup of brown sugar,1/3 cup balsamic vinegar, 2 tablespoons of olive

\*1. Place all in a saucepan and simmer gently for 45minutes until thick and syrupy.

\*\*2.100 gms pumpkin cut into thin slices about 2cms square, bake or pan fry till lightly brown.

When cool put onion onto the pizza if you have sorrel you can add shredded sorrel at this stage) then sprinkle with oregano or thyme, decorate with pumpkin and crumble 100gms of fetta over the top.

> Place into a hot oven 200 degrees until cheese has melted around 10-15 minutes

\* Any left over onion from the pizza can be kept in jar in the refrigerator for up to a month.

\*\*Any left over vegetables will do as a substitute for the pumpkin try, potatoes, zucchini, cauliflower, carrot, just use them up...its your pizza!!!

I love the rain but the poor old garden has had enough...lots of greenery but not many flowers and the veggies need the sun, but the beans are up and lots of Asian salad greens for the picking, experiment with some sorrel and let me know how you get on.
