
A Feast for the Senses

Local Library Services for Vision Impaired

Funds donated or granted by the Mumbulla Foundation, Friends of the Libraries, Rotary, and Robin Hood Service Clubs, have made possible new Bega Valley Shire Library services for borrowers with low vision. These services add to the existing audio tapes and books on CD. Four devices are currently available at both Bega and Merimbula libraries. In time they will be available in Bermagui. Borrowers without good vision can now borrow an Audio Navigator[®] - a computerised device something like an iPod© in size but which plays audio books rather than music. It reads books straight into

a catalogue of titles currently available from Bega or Merimbula. The chosen book is then loaded onto the device at the library, and the device is then borrowed in the normal fashion at the circulation desk. Angophora tree decline

It's been a big month for ecological misinformation in The Triangle. First the beach-washed mutton bird furore, and now the bizarre explanation offered in Brogo Babble for the poor health of Angophora trees: displacement of bellbirds by noisy "minors" (sounds like the neighbours' kids on trail bikes) leading to increased insect attack on trees. In fact both Bell Miners (a.k.a. bellbirds) and Noisy Miners have similar effects on tree health by driving other insectivorous birds out of their territory, increasing insect attack on trees. But Bell Miners live in forest and Noisy Miners live in open woodland and farming areas, and their paths would seldom cross. The so-called BMAD (Bell Miner associated dieback) has been listed as a Key Threatening Process in NSW. Anyone wanting more details can look up the following web address: www.environment.nsw.gov.au/ determinations/bellminerfd.htm.

No-one has yet nominated "NMAD" as a threatening process, perhaps because it doesn't threaten forestry and hence does not have an easily quantifiable economic cost. As for the Angophoras, I think the long drought is responsible for their current condition, combined with the fact that many trees exhausted their reserves by flowering profusely in 2007, only to be plunged back into drought in 2008. Not only Angophoras are affected: red gums are in a similar poor state, and many other trees, including some in forest.

I thought at first that the poor health was more pronounced in areas remote from the forested valley edges, which might imply a role for insects, since predators of insects are likely to be fewer in isolated trees. However, I have seen equally sick looking trees on the forest edges (where neither type of Miner is present), so this explanation does not hold water. Conversely, trees with access to a bit of extra water, such as the one in our yard, and ones growing close to dams, appear in better health. Hence I would pin the blame on the drought. Let's hope it ends soon, before too many more trees give up the ghost altogether.

Koala evidence

A. Cotterill (Letters to the Editor, February 2009) has the right to express an opinion about the koala status in the south east region of NSW. However, the findings of a joint project between the National Parks Service and the local Crossing Land Education Centre and Aboriginal students from Bega High and Eden High show reality from a different perspective.

We should not discount the work of these young students who trekked through bushland to find evidence of koala habitat. They discovered that koalas are living in forests just one kilometre from logging operations in the Bermagui State Forest. The evidence was: fresh koala scat and plenty of it. Reported in Narooma News, 12 November 2008 by Vesna Andric.

Seeking Sam Sinclair

In 1904 after the Boer War ended, Sam Sinclair cycled into Bermagui and set up a Blacksmiths shop.

Over time the shop developed

into a hardware and petrol stop and was a well known spot for a Sam was yarn. respected for his great kindness and sense of humour and over 60 years Sam's talents expanded to dentist, undertaker, boatbuilder, fisherman, big-game weigh master, boxer, champion strongman and emergency midwife.

Although he rarely drank, Sam featured on Tooheys advertisements for half a century with his quip, 'Here's Toohey'. He died on the 21st August 1964

at the age of 82. An obituary read, 'He was a man of many roles, with a stout heart and tremendous resolution.'



In 1935 a visiting circus, in debt to Sam, left him a 1912 Minerva motorcar as security, but nobody returned to collect it. Sam stored the car in his workshop, where it lay full

of chooks until he gave it to his friend Jack Winter on condition that it was not to be sold.

50 years on, 'Minnie', as she is

affectionately called, has been beautifully restored and passed down through the family. On Sunday 22nd March she will return to Bermagui, driven by Jack's Grandson Andrew

The Minerva was an early member of the Antique and Classic Car Club which formed 50 years ago. As part of the anniversary run from Sydney, she and 30 other

vintage cars will park outside the Museum for an hour. What a sight!

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

Later, when I moved closer into town, on two occasions when they visited and I happened to be away, my neighbours called the police. This made them too afraid to visit me - how shameful is that!

On another occasion when I brought some friends from Wallaga Lake home for coffee after a meeting, my friend Shirley Foster said, "Aunty Pat, what will the neighbours say about us blacks being in your home?" (Aunty Pat being my adopted name, which I am very proud of). Just one example of what's been done to the self-esteem of one of the finest individuals I have known.

Also why is it that whenever

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someone breaks the law here, evervone, including those authority, presumes that it's "those kids from Wallaga Lake"? Not once in all the years those same kids visited me did anything go missing, not even a biscuit out of the biscuit jar that I kept on the kitchen bench especially for them. It is also a known fact that the break-ins etc that we have are committed by all sides of the community.

It's such a pity that, as a group of people all living in the

Works on display included painted portraits, provocative digital photographic creations and sensual sculptures, luscious


lithographs and erotic drawings, hand crafted glass works and original installations - including a "peep" box show!


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Quintessentially Ouaama

It's a real joy to have Gilli back with us again and we thank her for her support and interest in our special attraction. \triangle


RCVP Invites New Members to Join in Exciting Training and Activities





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Soft Footprint Recipes



This month I found some lovely Golden Nugget pumpkins that are grown locally and tried them several ways.

Their round shape lends to cutting them in half, filling and baking.

Golden Nugget Bake

Cut in half and scoop out the seeds, make the bottom level by cutting it flat. Fill with peas and a decent dob of butter, some chopped mint, a dessert spoon of water and pepper and salt. Cover lightly with aluminium foil and place in a moderate oven till the pumpkin is cooked, about half an hour. These are nice with a roast or barbeque.

For a meal in a shell fill with a savoury mince, any leftovers or a good curry and bake. You can get carried away and cover the filling with mashed potatoes. Grate a little parmesan cheese on top and you have a good meal. Nice too with vegetables in season cooked in a cheese sauce and then baked.

Onion and Thyme Marmalade

This makes 1 litre.

2 kg onions cut into rings

3 cups malt vinegar

6 peppercorns

2 bay leaves

3½ cups firmly packed brown sugar

2 tablespoons fresh thyme leaves

> 1 teaspoon salt 10 sprigs of thyme 3cm

Place the onions and vinegar in a large pan. Put the bay leaves and peppercorns in a square of muslin or a new Chux and tie up. Add to the pan, bring to the boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 40-45 minutes, or until the onion is very soft.

Add the sugar, thyme leaves and 1 teaspoon of salt. Stir until all the sugar has dissolved. Bring to the boil, then reduce heat and simmer for 20-30 minutes, or until thick and syrupy. Skim any scum off with a slotted spoon. Discard the muslin bag and stir in fresh thyme sprigs. Spoon pulp immediately into sterilised jars, top up with the syrup and seal the jars. Label and date. Leave for a month before opening to allow flavours to develop.

To sterilise jars: place clean jars on a tray in the oven at 110 degrees for 20 minutes. Place lids in a bowl and pour boiling water over them, drain in a colander.

Try it with fresh crusty bread and camembert cheese ... good for a picnic or drinks.



Book Review



Christopher Koch, The Memory Room, Vintage Books. Recommended price: \$39.95

Many of you will remember The Year of Living Dangerously, if not for the book itself, then for the great film of the same name. Now Christopher Koch has repeated what he did in that book for helping us understand Indonesia, with this terrific novel, set in China and Canberra in the 1980s. It is a multi-layered book, centered on three main characters who were childhood friends in Tasmania, and who became entangled in the intrigues of ASIS, ASIO, and the KGB. I found it a bit slow to get moving, but once into it, found it equally hard to put down. The themes of obsession and secrecy are explored through the development of the characters, and their roles in the Australian Foreign Service in the dying days of the Cold War, and on the eve of the transformation of both the Soviet Union and The People's Republic of China. There are wonderful scenes of life inside China, and equally fascinating descriptions of Canberra



(and the Monaro) which will be familiar to most of us who live so close. I'm sure you'll enjoy this, and like me, it may provoke you to reread Koch's earlier award winning books.

For those who haven't been to the Bermagui library for a while – drop in – you'll be surprised at how the collection is growing!

G'day Fisherpeople!

Well things have started to pick up offshore. After a quiet start the Marlin have finally shown up, with several caught recently.

Kingies and Bonito are being caught at Montague Island although seals can be a nuisance; I've fished the island several times recently and caught plenty of fish but kept very few over legal size. Some customers have been more fortunate with a lady from Churchill, Victoria, catching a very nice kingie of 88cm as well as some good snapper and morwong.

There have been plenty of sharks about. One angler hooked a nine foot hammerhead half a mile off Bermagui entrance.

I hooked and lost a mako on the 12 mile reef, around 180-200 kilos, a fortnight ago.

Other anglers have caught makos, bronze whalers and hammerhead recently. Bottom bouncing has improved as well; one customer recently had a good day out catching 33 tiger flathead, ten morwong and 15 snapper on the six mile reef. The Six Mile and Brothers reefs have also been producing some fair catches.

The surf has slowed a little after the mad Christmas rush of salmon, where customers were catching them by the dozen up and down the coast. However bream and salmon are still about.

The Estuaries are fishing very well; last weekend I fished Wapengo with my boys for ten bream over a pound and seven good flatties up to two kilos.

The Bermagui River is fishing well at present, customers report good flathead between the bridge and downstream to the entrance, particularly in the evening.

My young fella Billy caught his first good dusty flathead off the corner the other night, around 65cm.

Things are looking very promising for the upcoming comps, the sea is alive with baitfish so hopefully we are in for a promising game fishing season.

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
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
