during which time he has always maintained safe water quality, immaculate grounds, taught people of all ages and capacities to swim, coached our aspiring Ian Thorpes and Leisel Joneses, performed lifeguard duties, taught water and surf safety, been active within Cobargo Swim Club, mentored many young swimmers, run the most fun kids' place in town in summer, provided a welcoming oasis in droughts. He recently worked with *The Triangle* to have pool film nights and assisted local schools with their swimming programs and carnivals. It's an extensive job description and requires a broad range of skills including being a decent

all round bloke. We are lucky as a community to have him in our midst.

You'd be forgiven for thinking all is well and 'if it ain't broke, don't fix it', especially when you consider that the lessees of Cobargo, Bega, Bemboka, Candelo and Eden pools have between them amassed nigh on 100 years of service to our community. There's social

years of teaching, training and maintaining, and it's priceless.

This year however, Bega Valley Shire Council has advertised widely and put the management of our Shire's pools out to tender. The complex and lengthy tender documents were the type one usually

sees in corporate dealings, completely different from the usual application process for our lessees. They were quite daunting, even to one who has been involved with tendering in the past. Rumours have circulated that council would like an agency such as the YMCA to run the Shire's pools in the erroneous belief that they will

save Council money.

Experience as close to home as Eurobodalla Shire has proven how wrong that concept is: country pools aren't real money makers and companies such as the Y just add another management/administration layer into the equation with the simultaneous diminution of real

> services and increase in fees at the pool.

> Tenders closed on 14 April and fortunately Jim put a tender in to retain his position at Cobargo. We, ratepayers, can let our Councillors know how we feel about this issue because they will have the final say regarding the successful tenderers for the Shire's pools. We can make a difference by contacting councillors to tell them we appreciate the work our local lessees do, that we believe their skill and experience is valuable and that we want to retain the community feel of our pools. After all, Cobargo pool was hand dug by locals in the early 70s so why should we now

hand it over to a corporate entity with no local ties and no passion for our community?

# Progressive Decade with Lots to Celebrate

The year 2011 marks the global centenary of International Women's Day. The first International Women's Day was held in a number of countries

in Europe in 1911, with a focus on women's rights to work, vote and be educated.

The United Nations declared 1975 International Women's Year with an International Women's Day celebration on March 8th. Since then International Women's Day has been celebrated in Australia on this day.

Nineteen seventy five also marked the first United Nations

Decade of Women (1975 to 1985).

Brogo resident Pam Duckworth attended the United Nations International Women's Year Conference in Mexico in June 1975, which ushered in this first Decade of Women.

'In the early 70s I was in New York representing a non-governmental organisation which had consultative status to the United Nations Economic and Social Council. It was very exciting to be part of the planning for the program for the first decade of women – a program which aimed to give women equal and effective opportunities for participation in local, national and international development

initiatives', Pam said.

'The conference in Mexico was attended by hundreds of women from all over the world – we were determined to make a difference and three decades later I know we did! There are now many more women in all walks of life who are fantastic role

models for the younger generation. While there are still barriers to women's full participation in business and politics, we need to keep celebrating the advances and working to break down the remaining barriers', she said.

After New York, Pam worked for many years in women's and development issues in the South Pacific

before returning to Australia. Her career included time as director of the Fiji Centre at the University of the South Pacific, arts administrator and political advisor in Canberra, and most recently director of a Commonwealth Administrative Review Tribunal in Western Australia.

Pat said, 'My experience working with women in developing countries taught me that it's never too late to be what you want to be

or do what you want to do. I'm looking forward to the global centenary of International Women's Day and a chance to celebrate what's been achieved by women, for women.'





## Healthy Soils, Healthy **Farms Project**

The Healthy Soils, Healthy Farms Project is holding a field day at Haxstead, Central Tilba on Friday 7 May.

Healthy Soils Healthy Farms is Landcare Association. The project will run for four years to look at ways of improving soil health and the potential to increase the amount of carbon that can be stored in the soil.

Each year soil and plant tissue tests will be taken, pasture assessment undertaken and biological treatments applied. This will be followed by a field day at each site to review the results and analyse what changes have

The field day will cover: paddock sub division and location of watering points, analysis of the soil test results, the potential for biological fertilisers, grazing management, plant identification, pasture assessment and tree planting for success.

Haxstead is one of two demonstration sites. The other field day is at *Brianderry* at Springvale, near Bega, on Thursday 6 May. Each site will have six plots - one, a control plot, the others with wide spaced trees, conventional treatment, worm leachate, commercial biological fertiliser, and compost tea.

Paddock design and grazing strategies are an important part of the project, using smaller paddocks with high stocking densities. The grazing period will be short, with sufficient recovery period so that stock does not return until the pasture is fully regrown.

## Koala Scat found in Mumbulla Forest

A new koala scat found near controversial logging in Mumbulla forest near Bega has cast new doubt on the future of woodchipping operations in the forest.

The scat, which appeared to be from a young animal, was found on Saturday two kilometres from where the huge logging machines are currently felling trees, and less than 500 metres from where they will move if logging progresses as planned.

While the scat was found just inside Biamanga National Park, it will add pressure to calls by conservationists to stop the logging, which resumed earlier in April. The scat has been verified as genuine by a koala expert on the staff of the Department of Environment, Climate Change and Water.

The find comes as tensions in the forest escalated and eight protesters were trapped in the National Park adjacent to the logging site for almost 12 hours. Conservationists will be calling on the government to stop the logging in the light of this new evidence.

This new find shows just how inadequate forestry surveys have been and how risky it is to continue logging in an area that is the stronghold of the



## Brogo Babble

## Who Lives in Brogo?

Steve Maginnity looks just like any other young man roused from his second cup of coffee and the weekend papers on this sunny morning. Get him talking about his long association with the Rural Fire Service (RFS) and his face lights up and it's easy to see his enthusiasm and commitment to the organisation.

Parents Barb and Tony Maginnity moved their young family from the Central Coast of NSW to Brogo so that their children could enjoy a country lifestyle. Steve started school at Bega Primary and went on to Bega



High. He was a competent student and a keen member of the Bega Swimming Club. He also worked up to three afternoons a week at Portelli's (which later became the Brogo River Bakery), and did general farm work for the Ypma's of a weekend. After graduating from school, Steve headed to the University of NSW to study industrial chemistry. He completed the first year

but felt that his destiny did not lie in that direction. The following year, local accountancy firm Kothes Pty Limited took on this young man and encouraged him to enrol in an Accounting Degree at the University of Wollongong, Bega Campus. He worked for Kothes for a period of time before joining the Sapphire Coast Anglican College in June 2009 as the Assistant Business Manager.

Tony, Steve's father, joined what was then the NSW Bush Fire Brigade, as a volunteer shortly after the family settled in Brogo. That's over twenty years ago now. Back then, before the introduction of OH&S regulations, members got together, learnt from each other and responded to fires in their area, without too much formal structure. Steve loved to tag along with the team to hazard reduction burns around the Brogo area, sometimes in his Dad's old overalls, boots and a spare helmet. He has clear memories of a big burn on Peter Thompson's place, and helping (or possibly just getting in the way) at working bees to construct the new (now 10 years old) fire shed.

These days, with the changes to the NSW RFS, and the need to be more formally trained, Steve has completed mainstream Bush Firefighting courses up to Crew Leader level, together with several other arbitrary courses including Village Firefighting, Conduct Briefings and Debriefings, Leadership, and OH&S. He was elected as Captain of the Brogo Brigade in 2008. He attributes his advancement to this role, as one of the younger Captains in the Bega Valley, to the mentoring he received. His father, previous Captains including Trevor Reeves, and Group Captain Brian Ayliffe, as well as dedicated members as Kerry Noble inspirational and always willing to guide him along the way.

What have Steve's experiences with the Rural Fire Service given to him? His face comes alight again. He believes that young people today do not always have a sense of purpose and common focus. 'Something I was once told, by a psychologist friend of mine, who happened to be a young person during that period, was that during the War years the rate of depression in young people apparently tended to be very low. Although he would never wish a war upon anybody, he notes that during those times the Nation came together with a common purpose, much like it did last year during the Black Saturday Bushfires. The RFS, although very different in nature to the military, offers a sense of purpose and belonging to those willing to give, and to that end, giving something back into your community can be a very uplifting and satisfying endeavour' he says.

He would love to see more young people join, especially teenagers who can join as Cadet Firefighters and enjoy learning new skills and experience the camaraderie which comes from working with, and depending on, a team in high pressure situations such as that of a fireground. Steve says, 'Young Sam, who is a fourteen year old Cadet with the Brogo Brigade, has developed into a very competent young person. She is currently the only cadet in our brigade, but she holds her own. Like me, her father is an active member of the brigade, but she is very independent and gets out there and gets on with it. If we could have more 'Sams' step up and volunteer; the future of the RFS would be in good hands, and perhaps these young people would share in the great enjoyment and fulfillment I have found in my service with the RFS'.







## Mahabharata (the film), Indian head massage and munchies in May



There are over three million pet cats in Australia. Even though they are domesticated they are still responsible for millions of the deaths of our native animals. On the average a domestic cat will kill 16 mammals, eight birds and eight reptiles a year.

This is a terrible price that our native animals must pay for people allowing their cats to roam free. This figure does not include the attacks that go unreported - the many native animals which simply die in the bush from their injuries.

Please never, ever dump an unwanted cat in the bush. Feral cats live miserable lives and are extremely destructive to wildlife.

## Something other than Pumpkin Soup!

The pumpkin harvest is lined up on the back verandah and plans for all the cakes, scones and soups to come dance in my head. However, the fondest thoughts are for Pumpkin and Fetta Pasta, a favourite main dish which combines the salty firmness of fetta cheese with pumpkin soup is the following the sweet softness of baked pumpkin.

#### **Pumpkin and Fetta Pasta**

Prepare 700g pumpkin, peeled and cut into small pieces, and baked until tender in a 220 degree oven sprinkled with 2 teaspoons of caraway seeds and 2 tablespoons of olive oil.



Pasta with roast pumpkin and fetta

Meanwhile cook 250g of spaghetti or other pasta in boiling water and drain. Combine the hot pasta with the pumpkin, 250g diced fetta cheese, 2 tablespoons of chopped Italian parsley and 50g of toasted pine nuts or almonds. Drizzle with a dressing of 80ml olive oil, 60ml lemon juice, 2 tablespoons of white wine vinegar and one crushed garlic clove if desired. Season, toss and serve warm with a green salad.

A delicious variation on version using carrots, in season now, pumpkin and the last of

## Green and Gold Soup

Six spring onions (or 2 medium onions and chives). Finely slice onions, reserving the green tops for a garnish, and simmer until soft in 2 tablespoons of butter or oil. Add one cup of finely chopped carrot and one teaspoon of cumin and sauté for a few minutes before adding 2 cups of chopped pumpkin, corn cut off 3— 4 cobs or a 440g tin of creamed corn, 3 cups of vegetable stock and salt and pepper to taste. Simmer until cooked. Add finely chopped onion



tops or chives a minute before serving.


## **Book Review**

This anticipated


