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Lessons From Cuba

It was a little scary coming out in public to present an information evening about permaculture, but judging the response from the packed crowd at the River Rock Café back in September, well worth the effort. I had felt a sense of frustration during the current climate change debate that the voice of permaculture was not being heard and that at the Earth Stewardship response to energy descent was simply ignored as some remnant oddity from the hippie era and totally unrecognised. So What! It's just a funky way of growing food isn't it?

Well ... it's not really. Screening the film 'The Power of Community' puts it into another league. Cuba was faced in the early 1990s with an oil crisis following the collapse of communism in the Soviet Union. A further embargo was placed by the US with cargo ships entering Cuba not allowed entry to the US for six months. They went through what they called a 'special period' for about six years in

which their entire country was re-designed. How they grew food, their transport, housing and energy all needed to adapt to oil depletion.

Permaculturalists from Australia played a prominent role during this period in setting up on-ground examples of what worked and training Cubans in permaculture design. In particular the area of urban agriculture was developed where every available

space was dedicated to the production of local food supply. The result seen today is that the capital of Havana now provides 80% of its food needs within Havana and that all Cuban agriculture is 80% organic. The rooftops of buildings became premium space for growing vegetables and 'chook tractors'.

Energy provision was fast tracked toward solar panels and wind turbines while they continue to experiment with bio-fuels. Waste from sugar cane harvesting can now provide 30% of electricity usage to Cuba for three months of the year.

During the special period, vital social services such as education, housing and medical provisions were maintained and further developed, which are often the first areas cut when countries face an economic crisis. Cuba now exports doctors to assist in the health of the Third World and other Latin American countries.

The power of this story, however, is the Cuban people themselves and how they faced this crisis together, as a community and the empowerment this gave them. That's what permaculture is about ... it's about people, food, working relationships

Bicycles were imported from China as transport and large public transporters, known as 'The Camel', became an ingenious use of prime

Ronald Arthur Benny – 'Cobber'

Happy 90th birthday Cobber.

What a pleasure it was to spend an hour with Cobber Benny. I heard on the grapevine that Cobber had turned 90 last month and thought it would be a good opportunity to have a chat with him.

Cobber was born in Cobargo in 1917, number 4 of 9 siblings. Cobber's father was already a Cobargo butcher. He originally set up shop with a mate – Welch and Benny Butchery, later going out on his own in what we now all recognise as Benny's Butchery. Cobber's original shop was where Benny's Butchery is, but was destroyed by the great flood. The present building was built after the flood.

Cobber went to the local school, leaving at the age of 14. His teacher said to him, 'We can take you no further, you may as well leave'. Cobber seemed pretty happy with that decision!

On day one of Cobber's very long working life, his dad gave him a bicycle and his first job was to ride round

Cobargo taking orders and then delivering them, neatly wrapped, the next day. But by the time he had turned 16 he could do everything, slaughter, clean, cut and sell. When I asked Cobber if he ever took holidays, he smiled and said, he worked every day, even Sundays. He did occasionally, though, get

some time off, and was known as a handy runner in his youth. He participated in the local sports days and at Narooma won 50 quid! A fortune then to the lad from Cobargo!

His elder brother Lou was the only other of the siblings who worked in the Butchery with Dad Benny and when Cobber was 25, Dad Benny retired and passed the Butchery onto Lou and Cobber. They worked it together until 1970, when Lou decided he'd had enough and Cobber bought

him out. On his recent birthday Cobber visited Lou. Lou is now 93, living in a retirement home in Bateman's Bay. He's wheelchair bound but still himself – great genes these Bennys.

Cobber's 25th year was pretty special. Not only did he become part owner of a butchery, he also met his wife, Doreen. Doreen's parents were dairy farmers and had moved to the area from Candelo. Doreen was working at The Bank Hotel in Cobargo – the building no longer exists, it was where the Vet's building is.

So there you are, 65 years later they are still happily married, Cobber still tends the garden, the citrus orchard and the plants in the shade house and he dries up after each meal! He counts himself very lucky: he has excellent health, learnt a good trade very well and found a life long partner.

Cobber was born to be a butcher, he has that lovely humour that we expect from our butchers and he's still got ALL ten fingers, and yes I did ask, 'Where does Cobber come from?' It's a nickname from his Dad. He loved hanging out with his dad as a small tacker and his father use to refer to him as 'his little cobber'.

The Effects of Equine Influenza

After surviving the effects of five years of drought and high feed prices, we are once again faced with a major dilemma. The equine influenza virus has hit NSW and Queensland. This flu virus has the capacity of bringing hardship not only to the racing industry, but also to local breeding studs and any business involved in pleasure activities – local saddleries, farriers, equine dentists, chiropractors and many other people who derive an income from the horse industry.

The rigid controls put in place by the DPI regarding the movement of horses must be adhered to, if we are to control the spread of this virus. We all need to work together and be very diligent. A veterinarian should be contacted if a horse shows any signs of ill health. The symptoms of the horse flu

are high temperatures, nasal discharge, a persistent hacking cough, and the horse may be lethargic and off their feed.

Any horse displaying suspect symptoms must immediately be quarantined away from other stock, and a rigorous quarantine procedure must be put in place. Stables, gear and all persons handling the horse must go through a decontamination process. The property must then go into a lock down mode.

The importance of allowing no visitors onto a quarantined property is the only way we are going to stop the spread of EI. Transmission occurs primarily between horses via the respiratory track, but can be spread by people who have had contact with a sick horse.

The effects of being isolated in a lock down have major ramifications on all facets of family life. Income is affected greatly. Doing the grocery shopping is a task with the decontamination process that must be adhered to. The quarantine period lasts for up to 50 days after the horse has caught the virus, and the mortality rate is of course higher in very young foals and older

horses.

All up and coming horse shows, gymkhanas and horse events will no doubt be cancelled. This will also have an impact on people trying to get their horses qualified to compete at the Royals.

So far we have been lucky with no reported cases south of Nowra, and let us hope it stays that way. Information on the spread of Equine Influenza can be obtained by logging onto www.outbreak.gov.au. A few studs on the Far South Coast have put themselves into voluntary quarantine to try and protect their horses.

A news flash from Canberra Royal is that they will take into consideration that people have not been able to qualify their horses due to the cancellation of many agricultural shows.



Some of the possibilities might include building your knowledge by attending a Basic Fire Fighters course. This would help you to become fire ready and have something to offer others, if needed.



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Dry River – Quaamaa – Quaama: A Brief History


Not only is St Saviour's 100 yrs old this year, but 2007 marks the 120th anniversary since the village of 'Quaamaa' (original spelling) was dedicated. There is a plaque in the Quaama Memorial Park commemorating the centenary of the village – '1887–1987'. Of course there was a white settlement here long before 1887, and even before the Robertson Land Act (1861) which permitted land leases south of the Limits of Location (on the south coast this was at the Moruya River).

According to Betty Taylor's research, Henry Badgery took up land at Dry River in the early 1830s! Betty's record states 'The settlement of Dry River was located mainly in the river area ... [but] as the village grew, it extended further up the hill to the north of the river. This area was known as 'Quaamaa', supposedly after the Aboriginal name for the area ... [the residents] petitioned to have the school and Post Office renamed Quaama'. Mrs Taylor adds that although the school was changed to Quaama on 18th March 1884, the Village of Quaama was not dedicated until 29th October 1887 and it was a further six years before the Quaama Post Office was officially

named on 1st June 1893 (ref. Betty Taylor (1997) *Dry River – Quaama: Our Schools and Our Heritage*, Published by Quaama Public School.)

Merv Penrith of Wallaga Lake, whose grandmother was Elizabeth Turner – herself daughter of Ko:ma of Dry River has roots in the Quaama region and explained that in his understanding – Quaama means 'shallow waters'. The more popularly known translations, 'squabbling ground' or 'meeting place' are also quite plausible as,

prior to European occupation, this region was a big meeting place for Indigenous groups from as far north as Shoalhaven; from the Manaroo and Delegate regions to the West, as well as for tribes from Gippsland to the south. Mumbulla Mountain was a very important place for the *Kuringal* (young men's coming of age). (Ref. Sue Wesson, (2000) *An Historical Atlas of the Aborigines of Eastern Victoria and Far South-eastern New South Wales*, Monash Publications, pp. 163–4). It is well recognised that the strength of development of our Eu-

ropean ancestor's occupation of Quaama was realised through the support of Indigenous populations in the region, and it is with awareness of this history, that all of us who are blessed to call Quaama home become more cognisant that we also are custodians not just 'property owners' of this special part of the 'Triangle'!

If only we could be as passionate about peace on earth, climate change, ending poverty, as we are about sport. I first hope the general public can allow him to get on with his life, remembering that while it's love that makes this old world go round, it's also love that makes the ride worthwhile, not the practice of destructive criticism.

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
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Cobargo Conversations

Garden Magic

A small effort in the garden now will save a helluva lot of work and losses when the heat hits. These mild days inspire us to go outside, so we might as well utilise the time productively. Idle hands do the devil's work.

So – feed and mulch now. Cow manure is the good old reliable standby, along with blood & bone. If they're too labour intensive, or if your knees are gone, use one of the pelletised types such as Organic Life or Organic Xtra, which you just broadcast throughout the area.

Any mulch is good mulch – it's essential to try and prevent moisture loss from the soil, particularly in hot or windy weather. Remember that wind dries plants out as much as summer sun. Lucerne is popular for vegie gardens because it puts nitrogen back in the soil (incidentally, roses seem to

prefer lucerne mulch). Sugar cane is easy to use and attractive. Any of the bark types are serviceable, as Maggie Smith would say. They last longer than the

other two, which have to be replaced about every four months as they break down into the soil. Pebbles are permanent (remember to put weed mat under them).

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
Book Review

Khaled Hosseini: 'A Thousand Splendid Suns' Bloomsbury Books. 2007 \$32.95

This is the second book by the Afghanistani writer, Khaled Hosseini, and follows on the success of his best seller, *The Kite Runner*, (which I think is being made into a film).

It's not unusual for the follow up to be a big disappointment, but in this case, it's just the opposite. While the first novel concentrated on the lives of the men of Afghanistan, this one highlights the lives of women during thirty years of history since 1973, dominated by invasions, civil wars and in particular, the rule of the Taliban. It covers the life of one woman from the age of fifteen when she is forced into a marriage with an older man, who later on takes a second wife.

The friendship between the two women, the tragic love story of the second wife, their daily struggles against brutality, the effects of war, and in particular, the unremitting violence against women could leave you to despair of the country and its inhabitants. But the real story is the triumph of human compassion and friendship and enduring love – told



without sentimentality but with a real ring of truth. If you liked *The Kite Runner*, you'll just love this.

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September Police Report

On Saturday the 8th of September a Wagga Wagga man was a passenger in a small fishing boat, which left the Bermagui harbour to go fishing off Bermagui. As the boat travelled over the crest of a wave the passenger fell and sustained a compound fracture to his ankle. The vessel returned to shore and the man was seen by Bermagui ambulance. Due to the seriousness of the fracture, air ambulance was contacted and attended from Canberra. The helicopter landed in Dickinson Oval and the man was taken on board and flown to Canberra hospital.

A marine incident report has been submitted by police to the waterways authority for investigation.

On Saturday the 25th of August an 18 yr old Bermagui man left a Bermagui club to find the windows of his car had been smashed. The man became angry and performed several large burnouts around the area before leaving. Police were notified and attended. The man was spoken to several days later and issued a penalty notice for 'burnout' (\$477 and 3 points). Police are seeking information on the person/s responsible for damaging the vehicle, a white VT commodore sedan, on the evening of the 24th of August. Anyone with information should call Bermagui police or Crimestoppers on 1800 333 000.

Police would like to remind motorists that they [police] also have the power to confiscate vehicles used to perform burnouts and the owner is liable for the cost of towing the vehicle

to the police holding yard in Queanbeyan plus the impound fee of \$12 a day. On the second offence the vehicle may be forfeited to the Crown (seized and sold by police).

On the 14th of September, following a domestic dispute on the previous day, police attended the address of 35 yr old Cobargo man to serve him an interim apprehended domestic violence order for the protection of his de-facto. The man was not home and whilst looking for him police located 14 cannabis plants growing in the yard and a shotgun behind a fallen log on the property. The cannabis and firearm were seized by police. About midday on the 15th of September the man attended an address in Cobargo and armed himself with a machete before threatening a Cobargo couple and then leaving in a vehicle. Police attended before travelling to Quaama where the man was located and arrested. He was charged with assault, possessing an offensive implement, offensive behaviour, offensive language, two counts of intimidation, possessing an unregistered firearm, possessing an unauthorised firearm, possessing a firearm whilst unlicensed, possessing a prohibited plant (cannabis) and given strict bail conditions. He will appear at the Narooma local court on the 25th of September and again on the 15th of November. September also saw three local residents issued with court attendance notices for drink driving and one for possessing a prohibited drug.

A few housekeeping matters: Consuming alcohol contrary to council notices prohibiting alcohol (such as Dickinson Park in Bermagui) attracts a \$110 on-the-spot fine.

Pushbike riders of all ages must wear an approved helmet. Failure to comply attracts a \$53 on-the-spot fine.

The beach is not an ashtray. Depositing an extinguished cigarette attracts a \$60 fine, which increases to \$200 if the cigarette is still lit. Most cigarette butts not properly disposed of end up in stormwater drains and flushed out to sea. They are then eaten by marine life or washed up on our beautiful beaches.

And finally, don't forget that most non-urgent crime can be reported to the Police Assistance Line on 131444. The report is taken on the phone and entered on the police computer database and reviewed by local police. Police encourage the public to use this line to report all crime in their area, no matter how minor, so police can get a better picture of what is occurring in their patrol. Lost wallets, mobile phones, bicycles, etc can also be reported on this number. Urgent matters should still be reported to '000'.
