"Then the Greens put pressure on the NSW Environmental Protection Agency who ruled that I couldn't build the Ark until they'd conducted an


environmental impact study on YOUR proposed flood."

South Coast Earth Rally

Healthy Estuary, Healthy Fish, Healthy Pelicans

A quiet change is occurring along our coast as many small local groups gather to take part in the South Coast Estuary Health and Climate Change Project. Overall this project is designed to engage community and industry groups and in our area to participate in valuable research about the health of our estuaries. It is being delivered and coordinated by Suzzanne Gray and Allan Broadhurst through Sulisit Consulting (derived from Celtic Goddess "Sulis" -Protector of Oceans, Rivers and Streams), together with the Bermagui Fishermen's Co-operative and numerous community groups.

It is delivering skills to local interested people, who are prepared to help with monitoring, protection and assessment of our precious estuarine ecosystems. After the February flooding rain, many of our lakes including Wallaga Lake and Cuttagee Lake opened to the ocean and this year they are remaining open. The cleansing impact of the oceanic water and the welcome rains have resulted in good fishing at Baragoot and Wallaga Lake - evidenced by the increased parking at the bridge and some very healthy looking pelicans (this was not part of the official program data collection).


Healthy fish are due to more than simply the entrance opening and a flushing by marine waters. It's a combination of things - the protection and habitat offered by the estuaries, the nutrients provided by catchment inputs

fuelling the bottom of the food chain (fish and estuaries. food), with the oceanic waters providing spat and juveniles to colonise the newly enriched and freshly flushed estuary waters. It's also due to the substantial rainfall, which helped fill the lakes and still maintains the high level in Baragoot, which closed up very quickly.

Local residents around Wallaga

Lake who have taken part in the surveys to date have learned how to assess water quality, to recognise seagrass species and record the biota present. Monthly water quality monitoring is proceeding and further workshops and field days are planned. As the project progresses and local groups develop their skills in ecosystem health assessment, there will be the opportunity for industry and community groups to have input into the development of protection and monitoring plans for these local lakes

The project extends from Batemans Bay to Eden and includes Wallaga Lake, Baragoot, Cuttagee and Wapengo. If you are interested in taking part in this project please contact Suzzanne Gray, Sulisit Consulting, ph 4471 6078 mob 0414 084 588.



Growing Looms


Who or what is a Loom Grower? We're a small group of local women who banded together in 2003 to provide looms to impoverished rural ethnic minority women in southern China so that they could regain their traditional craft, sell some weavings and embroideries, and raise their standard of living. We had contacts in the region and were successful in funding the supply of thread and the building and distribution of several large looms. Many of the weavings were purchased by us, made into table linen and sold at our fundraisers to create even more money for the project. Soon the villagers asked us to provide scholarships so that their children could attend school, and we responded.

By 2009 our reliable official contact in China was no longer there, so we

decided to focus our fundraising on Afghanistan and our existing relationship with Mahboba Rawi and her Sydney-based charity 'Mahboba's Promise'. Her country has the highest proportion of widows and orphans in the world, and as individuals many of the Loom Growers sponsor a widow and her children. As a group we work with Mahboba to provide funds for specific projects. We have bought four cows and sixty hens so far, and are building a well at a new orphanage in Tashgar. As rural women we have a special commitment to agricultural projects and we support the planting of trees and Permaculture gardens at Hope House, the centre of the charity in Kabul. Every traumatised orphan who is taken in is given a fruit tree of their own to plant and care for. It is a powerful symbol of renewal and permanence, and teaches them how to grow food - and all for \$10.

The Loom Growers are holding their annual fundraiser, a morning tea and sale of imported linen, clothing and jewellery, at the home of Carole Broadhead, 1 Welsh St., Bermagui, on Friday 19th November.

An end to the forest wars?

An impressive line up of speakers that included Professor Ian Lowe from the Australian Conservation Foundation, Ian Pulsford from DECCW (NSW Government) Forest Economist Judith Ajani and representatives from EDO, Lawyers for Forest, FSC Australia, Sapphire Coast Tourism , ACT Conservation Council, and the Nature Conservation Council of NSW and South East Region Conservation Alliance made the Forest Forum held on 13th September an important event.

The wide ranging discussion covered a multiplicity of areas which were centred around the new report produced by ANU Enterprises Pty Ltd. This report is an evaluation of the principle of Connectivity Conservation and a proposal to create a landscape scale conservation corridor that covers the Great Eastern Ranges and runs from the outskirts of Melbourne to Cairns.

It will be called the GER corridor and it builds on existing protected areas like National Parks and establishing buffer zones, corridor networks and stepping stones to protect biodiversity and increase resilience. It includes the existing BiCentennial Walking Trail that runs 5330kms from Healesville in Victoria to Cooktown and will also include eastwest corridors connecting coastal areas to the hinterland like the Sea to Snow. Kosciuszko to coast link and the Bournda National Park - South East Forests link.

Achieving this vision will necessarily involve working in an

innovative participatory way with people, organisations and communities with diverse interests. It will require the development of an agreed strategic plan for its implementation, people working voluntarily and working partnerships between organisations and individuals.

We are currently living through the sixth great extinction event, the first for 65 million years

and it is happening at an unprecedented rate. World wide the Union for Conservation of Nature 2007 Red list showed 25% of mammal species, 12% birds, and 33% of amphibians are now in danger of extinction. Australia is one of the extinction hot spots.

Councillor Forest ban dropped

Councillor Keith Hughes has succeeded in having a ban on entering Mumbulla State Forest dropped by the Bega Local Court. Councillor Hughes was arrested in May in Mumbulla forest in a protest against logging of koala habitat. One of the conditions of his bail was that he must not return to



Mumbulla Forest. "In the Bega Local Court last week I asked the Magistrate to drop the ban," he said. "The ban on entering the forest was unfair, especially as there is not even any logging going on in Mumbulla at the moment, so the police prosecutor agreed to my request," Cr Hughes said.

Councillor Hughes is also a member of the Biamanga Board of Management, which frequently requires him to visit the National Park. "The only way I can get to Biamanga National Park is through the State Forest," he said.

Councillor Hughes will appear in Bega Local Court on 2 February 2011 with 2 other people who were arrested in the same protest.

Eric Ginns

Although Eric Ginns has been living in the same home for fifty one years with wife Laurel, he has had four addresses during that time thanks to local Council changing the street name. Eric hadn't moved far, as he was raised in the house next door for the first twenty one years of his life.

Eric's father Raymond and mother Alma (Constable) built and operated a grocery shop and post office, in the 1940's where the 777 complex is now. Erics grandfather Albert and wife Sarah owned the land, not far from Ginns Road.

Growing up in Bermagui, Eric would spend time during the tuna season working as a deck hand, and caught the first tuna in Bermagui by polling at age thirteen on Eden vessel 'Kiah" owned by Pat and Barry Warren. On Ron Taylor's "Gladiator" he polled thirteen and three quarter ton of tuna in two and half hours.

At fifteen Eric left Bermagui Central School and worked at his parents general store as a grocer. When the shop was sold to Kevin & Cath Claydon, Eric worked at the Bermagui Country Club and later for Bill O'Shea at the Bermagui Hotel

In 1959 Eric married Laurel who worked in the Narooma Cannery, and they

had two children Bradley and Sonya. Laurel is a keen quilter and one of the original members of the Tuesday sewing group held in Bermagui.

Eric and Laurel can often be seen gardening and walking together around their neighbourhood.

Reminiscing about the early days, Eric recalled how his first pair of shoes (gumboots) were purchased from the sale of trapping and selling rabbits when he was about eight years old. A typical 1940's school boy, Eric's

prized possession was his catapult which he used one day to stun a seagull. He took the seagull home, painted it pink then released it. The pink seagull was reportedly seen in Batemans Bay and Eden, the story making the pages of the Daily Telegraph.

Eric's favourite landmark is Montague Island, but there are no long bus trips planned, as Eric claims if he goes pass Tilba he gets homesick!

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

Early September saw a flurry of activity at the two Central Tilba halls. A visit from the NSW Heritage Council saw the main hall turned into a virtual museum filled with local historic items, including many old photographs from the Corkhill collection. Several vintage horse-drawn carts from Mal Dibden's property also decorated the main street. By all accounts the visitors were suitably impressed and locals are hoping that this will lead to an enhanced listing in the State heritage system. Well done all concerned.

At the same time Eurobodalla Shire held a well attended Lantana & Biodiversity Workshop in the small hall. All us lantana infested landowners were pleased to learn that a coordinated effort to control this pest on Mt Dromedary and surrounds is under way. The Gulaga fire of a year ago destroyed large areas of this noxious weed and presented an opportunity to try and restrict its local distribution. Attendees were instructed on various control methods and encouraged to apply for limited funding to further this cause where applicable. A

major architect of this post-fire lantana control initiative was ex Tilb-ite (now Dalmeny) Graham Harding, council's recently retired Noxious Weeds Officer. It's good to see that his replacement, David Crass, has hit the ground running.

The presentations also included an interesting and well illustrated discourse on the flora of Mt Dromedary that centred on the flowering shrub Warty Zieria. This plant is endemic to the Tilba area only and is listed under the Endangered Species Act because of its very limited distribution around the mountain. A small clump had been previously identified at the Central Tilba 'Lookout' and had consequently been fenced off to protect it from grazing. As this was in close proximity to the hall some attendees, swelling with botanical zeal, made the pilgrimage to view said plant first-hand. Alas, they were faced with a withered remnant as (council??) persons unknown had mistakenly sprayed the clump with herbicide. A prima facie case of herbeous corpus! The catering provided by members of the Tilba School Parents Association

warrants praise. Yummo, ladies!

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


William Dalrymple, *Nine Lives:* in search of the sacred in modern India. Bloomsbury, \$35.00

For anyone with any interest in India, and in particular its spiritual and cultural diversity, this book is a must. It is easy to see why it has been so widely acknowledged as a significant contribution to the understanding of the sub-continent: Dalrymple is an outstanding historian and travel writer (his White Mughals is also a great read.) In this

latest book, he explores a range of religious traditions through the lives of nine people and their communities as one commentator put it, "a modern Canterbury Tales". It is a book you need to read in stages - the wealth of content and the sheer diversity of the lives and beliefs of the people is at times overwhelming, especially for those of us with only minimal knowledge of the different religious traditions. I read it in the same week I saw the outstanding Australian film production, The Waiting City - also set in India; by the end of the two experiences, I felt as though I had eaten a huge box of dark chocolates! I envy anyone who has

spent time in India – and encourage everyone to order this at the Bermaguilibrary – but set aside at least a week to make the most of it.

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Soft Footprint Recipies

Fingers crossed that this year our young mulberry tree and the ancient one in my neighbour's yard will have good crops of fruit. For two years frosts have ruined the harvest, but we are all hopeful of making jam, jelly and wine this season. Mulberries have a rich, winey flavour when ripe and often fall off the tree at this point.

Mulberry Jam

1.5 kg mulberries
500 g apples
1.75 kg sugar
Place the mulberries in a pan and
gently simmer in their own juice until
tender. Peel, core and chop the apples
and simmer separately in a small

amount of water until cooked. Combine the fruit, then stir in sugar until it dissolves and boil fast until the jam will set. Bottle and seal. Handy hint: If the mulberries need washing put small quantities in a sieve, dip it in and out of a basin of cold water and drain carefully to prevent bruising of the delicate fruit.

Twelve months ago I gave you some ideas for using eggs, because if you have chooks it's hard to keep up with the oversupply at this time of year. Here's a simple and delicious recipe using eggs in combination with seasonal vegies.

Vegetable Custards

2 cups of any one or a combination of the following vegetables: asparagus, carrots, celery, leeks, fresh peas, silver beet or mushrooms.

2 tablespoons butter

6 eggs, beaten

1 cup evaporated milk or cream pepper and salt to taste

Chop the vegies into very small pieces and saute in butter until cooked. Add a little water or stock if necessary to soften them and mash. Add remaining ingredients and beat well. Pour into small greased pots or one large container and place in a baking dish of hot water. Cook in a 200 deg.C oven for about half an hour, or untill the custards are just firm when pressed in the middle. Serve hot.



Garden Magic

Mulberries are one of the early fruits and so easy to grow. I remember when I was a Mallee boy that there was a large mulberry tree near the front of the house. This was the bane of my mother's life as the fallen fruit stuck to shoes and would stain the floors.I would climb the tree to pick fruit wearing only my swimmers and of course would have lots of stains on my body. The secret to removing the stains is to rub them off with unripe fruit.

Mother would make jam and also mulberry vinegar cordial, a refreshing drink in Mildura's hot summers.

The Shahtoot or white mulberry produces greenish white fruit that looks rather like caterpillars but is deliciously sweet and excellent eaten as a dessert. This mulberry has the advantage of being a small tree. The black mulberry can grow to a large size, however rigorous summer

pruning after fruiting can keep it to a manageable size.

Roses are making strong growth that is a magnet for aphids. These can be controlled with a pyrethrum spray applied to the growing tips. If the infestation is light, try washing them off with a jet from the hose.

Some of us in frost free areas will be planting potatoes and perhaps, tomatoes, although if there is a risk of late frosts, wait a little longer. It is best to avoid planting where these crops have been grown in the last year or two as the soil can carry over disease organisms that will damage your crop.

Commercial growers may sterilize the soil by injecting methyl bromide. Although effective from the point of view of disease control, eventually this will decrease the soil's health and fertility and increases the need for heavier applications of fertilizer - not good!

As the world's population increases, the effects of peak oil, peak phosphorus and climate change will be felt more and more. The art of producing food in a much more sensitive fashion will be of vital importance. We need to look for solutions beyond the use of chemicals which in the short term can be effective but in the long term disastrous and expensive. Our food producers need a fresh approach if we are to feed our populations in the future.

I believe that what we learn in our home gardens, using gentle methods, will be of great importance in times to come.
