

'Once, when I was just a girl,' I confide, 'I rode right down there, where the water flows.

Two girls ride horses in shimmering air tall chestnut gelding and small grey pony. The thin girl is dark, the other one fair. Horses' hooves strike burning bitumen as, lolling bareback, the girls roll through town

high soprano voices calling like birds the only other sounds as they go down.

Lurching down creek bank with tight reins in hand

to where thirsty willows trail their branchlets, picking their way across pool-pocked sand all moisture now drunk by the greedy sun. The girls drop their reins and they amble where they will on the way across the creek on a summer, Sunday morning ramble.

Ginger's startled by the 'ark' of a crow; and he is off towards a distant hill, thundering out of the dust he goes, Buttons and her rider chasing grimly. The girl on Ginger's back clutches his mane, legs clinging to the sweat-flecked, heaving flanks

bellowing for help from her friend in vain.

At last the horse tires of his headlong flight with hapless jockey bouncing on his back, suddenly slows then stops, lets her alight sliding down his side with pounding heartbeat. Buttons and her rider catch up at last And the girls roll laughing on the grass: 'I didn't know Ginger could run so fast!'

Kookaburra sitting on a fence post guffaws at the show they are putting on as if he is never going to stop.

On the bridge, I look at my wrinkled hand holding umbrella against the slanting rain. 'I was so young; it was so long ago.'


Quaama Harvest Fair and Dog Show Saturday 1 April 10 am - 2 pm



New environmental programs taking off at Quaama Public School

The students, staff and parents of Quaama Public School are implementing a number of new initiatives this year as a means of broadening their work within environmental education.

A gardening club has been established to give students the opportunity to learn about and care for the wide assortment of plants, shrubs and trees that are within the school. Led by School Learning Support Officer Jan Whyte, this has become a popular lunchtime activity.

Secondly, a recent grant from the Bowerbird Cobargo Community Op Shop has enabled the school to begin Stage 1 of their orchard project. The program, which is being co-ordinated by school parent Jasmine Ventura, will see a fully enclosed orchard constructed, containing a wide variety of fruit trees that will enable the students to have access to fresh organic fruit all year round.

Once again the students will be involved in all facets of the program. Students and staff are looking forward to the first sod being turned.

Finally, the school has also had initial discussions with the local Landcare group, who are involved in a wide range

Collisions with kangaroos and other wildlife increase. If you have guests from city areas, please ensure they are well aware of the dangers of hitting wildlife on our roads. They often drive way too fast during the vulnerable hours of dusk and far too many road kills are seen during the summer holidays.

As you read this – how about getting your mobile phone out right now and entering the Wildlife Rescue's phone number – 0417 238 921. You never know when you may come across injured or sick native animals and remember, this is their home as well as ours.

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Master Plan a great chance to beautify Bermagui

In 2018, Bermagui has a good chance of receiving over \$500,000 in Bega Valley Shire Council funding to implement a CBD Master Plan to beautify and improve the pedestrian safety of the town centre. In 2013, Council employed SPIIRE, a town planning firm, to develop CBD Master Plans for Bega, Bermagui, Eden and Merimbula. After undertaking exhaustive community consultations, SPIIRE produced four plans, which Bega Valley Shire Council approved in early 2016. Many in the community were closely involved in consultations with SPIIRE.

Philip Cox, a well-known architect who designed Bermagui's Fishermen's Wharf, the Sound Shell at Four Winds and the re-designed Bermagui Woolworths, which was done without payment, contributed the original concept for Lamont Street for the Bermagui Master Plan to SPIIRE, also pro bono. Its main design features include a colonnade mirroring the Fishermen's Wharf with sails

above, wider pavements for outdoor eating, planter boxes for shrubs and a consistent colour palette. Bunga Street will benefit from wider pavements and appropriate tree plantings. Several safer road crossing points are also included.

Derek van Bracht, the Council officer in charge of this process, recently confirmed that the Master Plans are high level designs which set out the major elements and directions on which more detailed landscape and construction designs will be based. He indicated scope certainly exists to improve detailed elements of the final plans. This can happen through further community consultation with the design teams.

Bega Valley Shire Council has almost implemented Eden's Master Plan, which the Eden Chamber of Commerce believes is very successful. Council has indicated Bermagui is likely to be the next town to receive funding because major road works underway in Bega and Merimbula

this year must be completed before they can commence their Master Plans.

At its last meeting on 1 February, Council passed a motion, moved by Merimbulabased Councillor Mitchell Nadin, that the draft 2017/18 budget development include seeking expressions of interest for detailed designs, based on the current Merimbula and Bermagui CBD Masterplans, to establish working plans in consultation with the respective communities.

Some commercial building owners in Bermagui have expressed concern they will be forced to pay up to \$10,000 to connect underground power, as shown on the Master Plan. Derek van Bracht has indicated that at a minimum, Council would place conduit within any new paving or footpaths to allow for future powerline burial. However, in implementing its Master Plan, the Eden community opted not to bury its power lines, due to the expense. So this would be a future decision for the community and affected building owners to make at the detailed design stage.

If Council allocates funds for detailed scoping and costing studies for Bermagui's Masterplan, the Bermagui Chamber of Commerce plans to hold workshops with interested business owners to seek their input into these studies. The Chamber of Commerce and National Trust Far South Coast Branch also would like to join other local groups to hold a community meeting to discuss the plans and ensure the detailed designs reflect our community's needs.

Pilates Starting in Cobargo

"The Pilates Method of Body Conditioning develops the body uniformly, corrects posture, restores vitality, invigorates the mind and elevates the spirit."

Pilates is a system of exercise that works to improve flexibility and build strength in the body. The movements emphasise alignment, coordination, breathing, balance and core muscular development, and range in difficulty from beginner-level exercises to more advanced movements. Pilates exercises can be modified to meet the specific needs of an individual and are often used for pain management, rehabilitation and physical therapy.

Practising Pilates also helps to develop concentration and focus the mind because each exercise is composed of highly precise movements. The focal point of Pilates is called the 'Powerhouse' and includes the muscles in the centre of the body, such as the abdominals, back and hips. Strong core muscles are critical for stability and allow for greater control of all bodily movements. 

A look into the Seaside Fair: Christine Bimson

When looking to put down permanent roots, Christine Bimson and husband Tony looked no further than Bermagui, moving into their home in June 1999.

Christine spent the first six years running a business from home before taking on a part time job with the Bermagui Visitor Information Centre. She then went on to work with the Bega District News, and later at Marshall and Tacheci Real Estate in Bermagui.

In 2011, Christine was again appointed Manager of the Bermagui Visitor Information Centre (VIC) and has remained there to the present time. She said, "It is very easy to love your job when you love where you live". The busy Visitor Centre, auspiced by the Bermagui Chamber of Commerce and Tourism, has gone from strength to strength in the last few years and has received high reviews and acclaim on internet travel sites such as Trip Advisor. However, Christine has often commented that the VIC would not be such a success if it were not for the dedication. the commitment and the professionalism of the volunteers, who keep the centre open seven days a week.

Despite Christine's busy work life, she somehow manages to find the time to be an integral part of the annual Bermagui Seaside Fair. Chris became involved with the Fair in 2003 after meeting with then Chairperson, Errol Masterson, who asked her if she would like to help out at an "event". Little did she know that this event would become a lifelong passion. She recalls that her first 'job' with the Seaside Fair was shovelling ice into lots of bags and dragging them over to the oval.

The organising committee are known officially as the Bermagui Seasiders Inc, and are a non-profit group whose charter is to raise funds for local youth and community projects. When the concept of a fair was developed back in 1987, it was decided to host the event during the offpeak tourist season as a way to encourage more visitors and to take advantage of



the wonderful weather we can provide in early autumn.

Christine joined the committee in 2004 and later took on the role of Treasurer and Co-ordinator of stallholder applications, and any other job going! When long term Chairperson, Jo Jacobs, resigned in 2015, Christine then took on the role of Chairperson.

The Seaside Fair, now in its 20th year, has become firmly ingrained in Bermagui's culture. Each year it follows a successful model, but is always open to something new. Three years ago, Denis Olmstead brought the idea of umbrellas at Bermagui to the committee. This project captured everyone's imagination and we have been witness to some of the most creative and innovative pieces of art ever seen. The auctioning of the umbrellas during the Seaside Fair has alone raised over \$14,000 for local youth activities.

Although Christine's involvement and workload for the Seaside Fair is huge, she wants to acknowledge that there are many others who share this workload every year. There are only six members that make up the organising committee, which is quite amazing when you think of the amount of work that needs to be done. However, Christine explained that there is a small army of volunteers who help on the day and highlighted the likes of Marine Rescue spending the day just emptying the rubbish bins and the Cobargo scouts, who camp out on the oval overnight to provide security for the stalls and other equipment that is set up the day before and of course who would forget all those helpers who butter the bread, cook the sausages, look after the exhibitions and those that just generally run around and troubleshoot all day.

She also went on to say that, "the financial and in-kind support from local businesses is an integral part of the fair" and wanted to thank each and every business that is involved.

The 20th Seaside Fair on 11 March 2017 is shaping up to be one of the best with an amazing line up of entertainment, and with a theme like "Mad Hatters Party", the street parade should be a huge success.

Local residents and visitors alike are beginning to notice the beautiful signs that are drawing attention in Bermagui, Fairhaven and Wallaga Lake. There are new "Welcome to Djiringaji Country" signs at the entrance to Bermagui. These signs feature the black duck, which is the totem of the Yuin people.



There are nine other large, colourful signs placed in strategic locations throughout the town and at Wallaga Lake, which tell the stories, the legends, the history and recent achievements of the Djiringanj clan of the Yuin Nation, who have been custodians of this area for around 50,000 years.

The Bermagui area has many sacred and significant sites for the Yuin nation. One of the largest midden sites in NSW, covering over seven acres and four metres deep, is located at the end of Fairhaven Point. Murunna Point was another important ceremonial site with clans travelling from other regions including the Monaro to attend gatherings and corrobborees there. All this information is explained on the signs.

The Yuin Cultural Heritage Trail was initiated by the Far South Coast Branch of the National Trust and Merrimans Land Council. The project was jointly funded by the National Trust Far South Coast Branch and the Mumbulla Foundation.

Frances Perkins, Chairperson of the National Trust Far South Coast Branch, said she is very grateful for all the fantastic collaboration and help received for the project over the last four years. She would like to acknowledge the huge contributions from Merrimans Land Council elders, particularly Lynne Thomas, daughter of revered elder Guboo Ted Thomas, who advised on the signs locations and provided the legends and history told on the signs.

The Bermagui Public School was also an enthusiastic partner and the children provided the beautiful artwork.

Bega Valley Shire Council, particularly Graham Moore, Aboriginal Liaison Officer, provided valuable information and Council were very supportive, as was the NSW Office of Environment and Heritage.

Frances also acknowledged the "heroic job" done by the Wallaga Lake/ Bermagui Men's Shed, the members of which spent several weekends installing the signs in very hard and dry earth.

Men's Shed President Bill Johnston said, "Being part of this project has been a real pleasure for those involved, whilst giving the fellows a much better understanding of Yuin culture and heritage".

Dawn is involved in many voluntary organisations, helping with the organisation of opportunity shops and the South Coast Producers Association.

She was the secretary of the local Rural Women's Network committee that put in a successful submission to host the 2005 Rural Women's Gathering.

However, it has been the U3A which has been most impacted by Dawn's special skills and vigour. Dawn joined the U3A in 2011. U3A is a voluntary educational organisation with branches across the country. It creates lifelong learning experiences for people in their third age (mostly in retirement) in the community. It is a shared learning which harnesses talents

in society and allows those with a passion for a subject to then share that knowledge with others in the community. Thus the educational life of our society is enhanced. This happens with no payment. Women's Resource Centre Fundraising Dinner International Women's Day, Wed 8th March 2017

Southern Women's Group (SWG) is a community-based not-for-profit organisation and has been delivering services to women, girls and their families in the Bega Valley for 33 years. SWG manages and auspices the Bega Women's Resource Centre (WRC) and the Far South Coast Women's Domestic Violence Court Advocacy Service (FSCWDVCAS).

Funding for WRC through FACS is minimal and is targeted at providing 1400 occasions of service. In 2015-2016, WRC provided 5741 occasions of service.

In addition to support and referral

around domestic violence, sexual assault, mental health, unemployment, parenting and general family issues, WRC runs in partnership with Bega High School a Girls' Alternate HSC program, participates in the Food Rescue Program and provides free food to families on low income or in crises.

Between July 2016 and January 2017, 500 women were supported with this program. They also run regular art, craft, music, exercise, heart health, tackling tobacco and general information workshops. These activities are funded through small grants and donations. They encourage women's participation through volunteer activities. In 2015-2016 volunteers contributed time valued at \$93,366.

Funding for WRC does not cover these overheads, and thus we are attempting to raise funds in a variety of ways, including crowdfunding (givenow.com/ southernwomensgroup), an online auction, and the 2017 International Women's Day Dinner.


On return from Barcelona the paintings flowed with a new enthusiasm whilst Crane worked in her South Pambula studio.



Simple Sponge

Nothing nicer than a slice of fluffy sponge cake with cream and fresh summer fruits.

Replace flour with Gluten Free alternative. Quick and easy to 'whip up'.

4 eggs separated (fresh from local chooks, so much nicer). Take out of the fridge earlier to reach room temperature. ³/₄ cup caster sugar

1/3 cup each plain, SR and cornflour.

 $\frac{1}{2}$ tsp baking powder (or use GF alternative)

1/2 tsp vanilla paste

Beat egg white till soft peaks and slowly fold in caster sugar. When well incorporated add egg yolks one at a time, then vanilla.

Remove beaters, sift in the flours then fold gently together.

Lastly add a tablespoon of hot water to the mix and fold in.

Prepare your preferred tin with cooking spray and baking paper and spoon in the mixture. Tap the

tin slightly to evenly distribute the mixture.

Bake in a pre-heated oven, medium-hot, for approximately 20-25 minutes. The cake should have risen and be a pale golden colour and come away slightly from the side of the tin.

Do the skewer test to see if cooked though.

Leave to cool in the tin then turn onto a rack.

Fill/top with cream and fresh summer fruit. Passionfruit is my favourite at the moment.

Annie Dunn, Sebastian Barry, \$19.99

One of the greatest joys of my life is reading almost anything written by almost any Irish writer - and Sebastian Barry is in my top five favourites. Over Christmas I read Days Without End, and then found Annie Dunn. Set in the 1950s in Ireland, it could have been describing the lives of 19th century rural women. So little had changed for those who struggled on marginal farming land, who were unmarried and who relied so heavily on themselves and their relationships with family and neighbours. Annie and her cousin Sarah manage a small farm by themselves; as "spinster aunts" they also take on the responsibility for two young relatives whose parents are away in London looking for work. The book describes the everyday challenges of unrelenting work and the precarious ability to survive when faced with such decisions as selling their only horse, thus their only means of transport.

Annie's existence relies entirely on the



Sebastian Barry's writing is often described as poetic, and *Annie Dunn* is the ultimate example of that truth – it is really beautiful. In 230 pages he packs in a fabulous description of Irish country life, of families, of the essential decency of humanity in the face of the dark side. Treat yourself to reading it straight through.
