Diggin Diggies

I accidentally became the Secretary of the Dignams Creek Community Group Inc due to a jolly mood and a warm winter fire at our June AGM. After putting up my hand, the outgoing secretary leapt up instantly to bring me a bag of books and papers. What treasure I found there! Many different styles of handwriting have carefully recorded the projects and concerns of Diggies residents in minutes dating back to 1995, featuring names of people still here, and others long gone. The Diggies community has a long history of fun through koala surveys, bush picnics, the finding of rare plants (by Vernon Pretty), guest speakers on all kinds of issues and fundraisers that built our fire shed. Some of the unfun seems perennial too – phone line dissatisfaction, feral animals, bushfire preparation and wrestling with two councils about the state of our road.

Continuing the fun part, an idea came to Nick van Stek and me that we called 'Feed Diggies'. As prices go up and it's virtually necessary to take out a mortgage to buy an Iceberg lettuce, we thought it might be great to share skills and tools to increase the productivity of our gardens. We also wanted to find a way to swap

and share veggies, eggs, bread, preserves, seedlings or help each other with fencing or building chook yards. We shared our idea through the fire-tree contact list, diligently kept by Fiona Kotvojs, and twenty people said YES, PLEASE! At our first gathering we realised that among the group, we had about 68 hours of labour per month, a giant list of skills in all kinds of food growing and animal husbandry departments, and a very generous combined tool shed, including four tractors. We decided to do a monthly working bee at someone's place, and to share a meal afterwards, bringing anything we had in excess for swapping and sharing.

At our first get together at Shanti's and Sol's place, we started building the Diggies Share Shed from materials donated from several households, learning a bunch of Nick's building tricks. It was a great first meal too, heavy on the egg-based dishes, and two seriously good cakes. We will soon finish the shed and use it to share our fruit and veggies, plants and eggs with each other, and sell to the wider community on an honesty basis. Duck in next time you visit Diggies and see what goodies you can find!

Council records significant operating surplus

Council has just released their draft financial statements for the year ended 30 June 2022 that show a net operating surplus of \$14.9m. This result is after non-cash depreciation of \$24.4m, but before capital grant revenue of \$43m.

Income includes rates and annual charges of \$56.3m which have increased 4.4% over the year, reflecting a strong increase in Council's rating base. Council has benefited to some degree from a one-off increase in disaster recovery grant funding that was paid early to councils as part of the economic support provided due to the pandemic.

Council is still considering a 35% increase in our general rates from 1 July 2023 to ensure that Council finances can meet the expectation of the level of services that the community needs.

Council minutes of 4 May 2022 note that the Long Term Financial Plan 2023-2032 (scenario 2) models a single year special variation to rates of 35% permanently applied to the rate base commencing 1 July 2023.

The Council CEO, Anthony McMahon, subsequently clarified that the 35% proposed rate increase only relates to your base rates, not to your water, sewer and waste rates. This means for most, the overall ongoing rates are proposed to be increased by between 10% and 20%.

It is important to stress that no decision has yet been taken by Council in this matter.

In its long-term strategic plan, Council was assuming a population increase per annum of only 0.65% over the next twenty years

The recent census results for the shire show the population has increased by 5.4% and occupied private dwellings

have increased by 10% in just the five years to 2021.

Based on this information, Council should review their strategic and financial plans to ensure that the population and housing growth that is occurring is taken into consideration.

The National Library Visits

The Australian National Library visited Cobargo and Quaama and will go to Nerrigundah soon. On Sunday 14 August, in partnership with the Cobargo Bushfire Resilience Centre Inc. (CBRC), representatives from the National Library of Australia visited Cobargo and Quaama to speak with locals about the National Library's *Badja Forest Road Fire* oral history project.

Record your story about the fire

Working with the CBRC and members of the affected communities, this project hopes to capture sixty oral history interviews as an enduring historical record of those who lived through the fire and its aftermath.

Rhonda Ayliffe, Vice-chair of the

CBRC, opened both events and Dr Shirleene Robinson, National Library Director of Curatorial and Collection Research, and Scott McKinnon, an expert oral historian who works with the National Library, spoke about the project and answered questions from the community.

A third community information session will be held in Nerrigundah at 11.00 am on Sunday 27 November at the Nerrigundah Agricultural Bureau Inc. Community Shed. The Library understands the need to represent the full diversity of experiences through interviews.

About oral history

The National Library has the largest oral history collection in Australia, covering many eras and subjects. Oral histories are carefully structured audio recordings where an interviewee works with an oral historian to tell their own story in their own words. It's entirely up to the interviewee what is shared in an interview, and interviewees get to decide on the access rights (that is, who gets to listen to the recording).

For more information about the project or to express your interest in participating, please visit the National Library of Australia website and search for 'Badja Forest Road Fire'.

The recordings will be kept forever in the National Library.

University of the third age

In August, U3A Bermagui members attended a talk by Garry and Paul Campbell from the Wallaga Lake community. Garry and Paul are identical twins. They were born here and joined a long line of Campbells in our area, with official records (white colonial) dating back to 1848.

We learnt a lot about local indigenous history, the history of the now Wallaga Lake Koori Village, previously The Mission, of the present conditions and of the concerns regarding past, present and future developments encroaching on Indigenous heritage without consultation.

In September we went walking with Garry, Paul and their wives, Miriam and Marian. We were also joined by the delightful Patrick.

It was cold and wet but that didn't dampen the joy. We started at the Fairhaven Point midden, the biggest in southern Australia, estimated to be six metres deep and used for millennia. It is an extraordinary asset to archaeologists, the local community and tourism. And Patrick read us his beautiful poem about Wallaga Lake.

We then went to Camel Rock. More talking, more questions, more gems of ancient knowledge.

Our last stop was the Bermagui sacred waterhole. The site is severely neglected and overgrown with exotic weeds so no access can be gained and the signage cannot be read. There is also a block of units encroaching on one side, despite

objections from the Yuin people. This situation is very frustrating for the Yuin people and the Campbell family who were the traditional 'Watchers' and who whole-heartedly wish for it to be restored but have not been able to do so.

It is heartbreaking to see such a significant site, gazetted as an Aboriginal Place in 2009, with a long and important indigenous history, so neglected.

Members of U3A have been following up with Council, the National Parks and Wildlife Service and Crown Lands in an attempt to understand how this situation can be rectified.

Merrimans Land Council has now granted permission to begin restoration work and U3A look forward to this occurring.

Springtime is the time of renewal and growth. It is also a time of transition with variations in weather – this year the vivid green of the hills and valleys is evidence of the abundant rainfall over the last month. While it's soggy underfoot here with some flooding in low areas, let's spare a thought for those across the country who are experiencing serious and often unprecedented flooding. We all have a part to play in supporting our fellow Australians but also doing what we can to limit the effects of climate change ... as Saul Griffiths says in his recent book, *The Big Switch: Australia's Electric Future*, electrify everything! We can start this in our own homes now.

Business innovation

Native forests are a very familiar part of life on the Far South Coast. However, we also have native marine forests of which Golden Kelp is a major part – its natural habitat extends from northern NSW, down the east coast, across all the Australian south coast and up the west coast to Geraldton, an area which is known as the Great Southern Reef. These massive kelp forests are in decline due to a combination of factors that include rising ocean temperatures and, particularly in this region, an increase in sea urchin numbers. Sea urchins feed on young kelp and there appears to be a decrease in the numbers of mid-sized fish and lobster, the natural predators of sea urchins. Kelp farming is considered an environmentally sound way to reverse some of these trends while potentially reducing ocean acidification, improving local biodiversity and improving the overall environment by storing carbon.

In March 2021, I wrote about the work that Jo Lane and Warren Atkins are doing at their state-of-the-art kelp laboratory at Tilba Tilba. This is the next chapter in their journey. Following a Churchill Fellowship trip in 2019 to research kelp farming overseas, Jo and Warren have been developing ways to create a kelp seedbank – the first step in kelp farming. To their credit and with a lot of hard work, they have successfully established a process to produce baby kelp – the only non-university entity in Australia currently doing this. The fascinating aspect of this is that the kelp seedbank, made up of tiny male and female gametophytes, can be held in limbo for years under red light, increasing in density but not reproducing. Once placed under white light they will reproduce and attach to fine marine-grade string, all done under strict laboratory conditions. When these spores grow to a certain size, they are ready to be farmed. Jo is currently working with

NSW Marine Parks on pilot Golden Kelp restoration projects that include a better understanding of sea urchin behaviour.

Kelp farming has many possibilities in the circular economy. Apart from its well-known health benefits – which is the basis of Jo's primary kelp business, Sea Health Products – it can be used in cosmetics, can be made into plastic, makes wonderful fertiliser and has great potential for flooring and building materials and for plant-based meat.

However, to start a kelp farm requires fortitude and financial resources to navigate a complex and not easily understood regulatory framework. Jo has successfully won the tender for three marine areas - Bermagui, Pambula and, more recently, Eden. To get the required permits for farming though, requires an Environmental Impact Statement at an estimated cost of \$400,000 and, further, is deemed to be a State Significant Development with additional processes to fulfil. These requirements are similar to what is required of a large multinational company and seem grossly excessive for a proposal that has the potential to add great value to our marine environment, with little if any negative effects. Rather, the regulatory process does not encourage investment or innovation to the point where a business, like Jo's and Warren's, may seek to move to another jurisdiction that has a more supportive and financially achievable process, such as that found in South Australia. This means the potential loss of a first - kelp farming in the ocean - for NSW.

Jo is doing all she can to comply – seeking funding, making contact with people who may be able to assist and talking to local politicians. Federal MP Kristy McBain visited the day before my visit and was supportive and encouraging and, as it is primarily a state issue, there may be more input. Meanwhile another year



has been lost as kelp grows over the winter – hopefully progress can be made by next winter!

On a really positive note – Jo was invited to submit her business to Coralus, a global community that supports women and non-binary people through radical generosity. Jo's business is one of five Australian ventures out of a hundred applications to be granted this radically different support – a significant achievement that goes some way to offsetting the frustration and the huge amount of energy and time required so far on this journey. Congratulations, Jo and Warren – your efforts are inspirational and we all wish you well.

To find out more about seaweed this is worth a look – search for miraculous seaweed BBC.

Celebrating John Small

Friends from far and wide gathered on 24 September in the Small Hall at Central Tilba to pay tribute to our recently departed friend, John Small.

A fascinating exhibition of his artwork, chalkboards, photography, signwriting, poster and banner art, cartoons, clever words and dry wit was on display in the Small Hall, showing us all how enormously prolific John was and how he excelled at everything he turned his hand and mind to. The display demonstrated how intrinsically involved John has been in the life and fabric of the Tilba district over four decades including his seminal role with local 1990s band The Predicaments, his tireless work for the Tilba Festival and School of Arts, the creation of a time capsule and photos of the children at both the Tilba Primary School and the Tilba Stiltzkidz.

Many fine words were spoken including a précis of an article written for the National Library of Australia by local historian Laurel Pacey featuring John's social contribution through photographing the life and times of the community since the

early 1980s. He is recognised as the contemporary equivalent of William Henry Corkhill.

An old friend, Phil Hall, reminisced about John as a young man in 1977 in Canberra where he was a founding member of a motorbike club. Phil recalled how John had snapped a famous moment in motor bike history that is still seen throughout the world today. A mellow peaty whiskey was proffered by long-time friend, Waz, and we all raised a glass to our mate. He too shared many funny and poignant stories about John. Others who paid tribute included Sean Burke, Viv Bowe, Sol Clarke and the writers of this article.

Our dear friend Smally succeeded in balancing his internal and worldly discontents with an heroic output of creativity, flair, generosity of spirit and a uniquely irreplaceable sense of humour.

Big Ideas happening in Tilba district

One of the important outcomes of the Strategy process for our Tilba district was the establishment of several subcommittees to deliver on the Big Ideas that were included in the Strategy. I wanted to report on three current exciting initiatives.

The very active History and Culture group, chaired by Bronwen Harvey, is developing projects that aim to include both Aboriginal and more recent history. The Landscape group, chaired by Mark Stubbings working with Geoff Pryor who is President of Tilba Environment Landcarers, recently organised a very interesting forum on Biosphere Reserves that I attended along with over seventy other locals. 

Support for Biosphere Reserve for Tilba district

Considerable support for nominating the Tilba district as a Biosphere Reserve emerged from a recent public forum of over seventy people in Central Tilba on Monday 17 October. Jointly organised by Tilba Environment Landcarers (TEL) and the Landscape sub-committee of the Tilba Strategic Plan chaired by Mark Stubbings, the forum considered the implications of putting the region forward for accreditation by UNESCO as a Biosphere Reserve.

Biosphere Reserves are areas of terrestrial, marine and coastal ecosystems managed with the aim of balancing biodiversity, conservation and the sustainable use of natural resources. There are 738 Biosphere Reserves in 134 countries, with five already operating in Australia. Geoff Pryor, President of TEL, said, 'Our aim was to consider how the region's landscape, culture and community could be protected by being declared as a Biosphere Reserve.

'Judging from the positive responses to the presentations and in general discussion, there was strong support for this challenging idea. This is encouraging, as developing a nomination is a timeconsuming process requiring extensive community engagement and consideration of the values we want to protect in our region.'

Garry Campbell of the Merrimans Local Aboriginal Land Council began the forum with a Welcome to Country.

Forum keynote speaker, Professor Peter Bridgewater of the University of Canberra and Australian National University, has thirty years of experience working on Biosphere Reserves around the world and in Australia.

Professor Bridgewater said, 'Biosphere Reserves ensure local communities are fed, kept healthy, make room for nature and build better, stronger community networks based on accepted values. These structures are not another layer of governance.'

David Moore, Manager of Environment and Sustainability Policy at Queensland's Sunshine Coast Council, who joined the meeting by video conference, shared the Sunshine Coast Council's journey to be recognised as Australia's most recent Biosphere Reserve in June 2022. After considering several different national and international mechanisms, UNESCO's Man and the Biosphere Program was identified by the Council as being best placed to support further recognition of their vision of the region's sustainability and strategic directions, values, credentials and future initiatives. He pointed out that the process took several years and required significant resources to both prepare a nomination and undertake planning for implementation, in which the involvement of the community and local First Nations peoples was critical.

Eurobodalla Shire Councillor, Anthony Mayne, attended the meeting along with three senior Council managers and provided an overview of relevant policies and actions taken by the Council, indicating that there is a keen interest in the concept.

It is anticipated that steps will be initiated within weeks to take the Biosphere Reserve concept further. For more information contact Geoff Pryor, TEL President, on 0428 930 196.



We will highlight our activities and the project milestones that have been accomplished over the past twelve months and the plans for the year ahead.





Cobargo Conversations

Forty years ago this November ...

When Tammie Gee (née Corby) was four years old, she was at her father's butchery in Cobargo. While putting meat into a century-old mincing machine, young Tammie's left hand was caught and it immediately became trapped. Local emergency services couldn't devise a way to safely extract the mangled hand, so they rang the police rescue squad. The upshot was that a plan was made to dismantle the mincer from its base and Tammie, with mincer attached, was flown to the Prince of Wales Children's Hospital in Randwick.

There they laid Tammie on a mattress outside, erected a tarpaulin so she couldn't see anything and proceeded, with great care, to cut along the length of the mincer's outer casing using a quickcut tool. It took almost an hour and involved the careful use of a large industrial cutting implement,

hosed down regularly to minimise the heat generated by the cutting from burning her arm. The final phase involved using a hammer and chisel along the cut, an equally difficult task that required the use of force.

With the mincer finally off, Tammie was rushed into the hospital for what would be over seven hours of microsurgery. Apart from losing the tip of one of her fingers, Tammie has been able to regain the mobility of her hand.

Talking to Tammie about it, she says she has very few memories of the event but can remember the flight and telling them that her arm was heavy – it had a mincer attached!

The mincer ended up in the Rescue and Bomb Disposal Unit Museum.

When Kelly Ryner settled into the beautiful community of Cobargo in 2020, just a few months after the fires, as the trees started turning from black back to green, she was inspired to paint the returning of our precious wildlife.



Bodies of Light Jennifer Down Text Publishers, \$32.99

This novel won the 2022 Miles Franklin Award and was short listed for the Stella Prize. *Bodies of Light* was praised by reviewers and compared to *A Little Life* by Hanya Yanagihara and Douglas Stuart's *Shuggie Bain* so I was excited to read it but aware that it may be confronting. Maggie has escaped her life in Australia and changed her name twice but an email from a childhood foster-care friend who is trying to find her throws her into the memories she has tried to forget and thus begins her account of a tragic life in the form of a memoir.

Maggie is an unreliable narrator, sometimes lucid, even brutal, at other times foggy and hazy. Whatever the mood, dark or light, the writing is beautifully evocative and true.


We follow Maggie's life from the age of four in 1973 to the present. She is first abused at four by a family friend and from five years old is in a Children's Home or placed in foster care. Most of these

are unloving or even cruel and Maggie is again abused by her foster father. This novel shows the gross inadequacy of out-of-home care in Australia and, according to the Royal Commission, not much has changed since the 1970s.

We think that Maggie may have found happiness in a loving marriage, but any happiness is marred because Maggie keeps her past secret, even from those she loves and so can never be her real self. She acknowledges to the reader that she doesn't know who she really is. This theme of love lost because so much is kept hidden continues through the novel.

Further tragedy and loss come, and come, and come some more. There is a resemblance to the Kathleen Folbigg case, and it is probably here that I stopped believing in this novel.

The novel is written in the first person as a memoir, so we only have Maggie's voice and thoughts and, for me (and I suspect I'm in a minority here), it started to strike a false note. The author interviewed many people from similar backgrounds to Maggie's but, as a fictionalised memoir, it



didn't entirely hit me in the solar plexus as it should have. And, again, that may just be me. I think a third person view would have served her better.

It is a beautifully written novel of tragedy and, finally, quiet survival.

Simply make a booking with your vet, show your pension card and you only need to cover the balance of the de-sexing cost.

Remember not to leave pets in cars. It is against the law and is a very cruel death. Phone police if you find a dog shut in a car and they are panting.

Everything Cajun

Years ago, I was researching for my thesis on Cajun music, and I discovered that Cajun food was as interesting (and delicious) as the music ...



Cajun spice mix

Ingredients:

- 1 tablespoon garlic powder
- 1 tablespoon onion powder
- 2 teaspoons white pepper
- 2 teaspoons black pepper
- 1½ teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 2 teaspoons dried thyme
- ½ teaspoon dried oregano

Method:

Mix spices together and store in an airtight jar.

Chicken and ham jambalaya Ingredients:

1 kg chicken wings (bone in and cut into 'buffalo' wings)

3 cups chicken stock

500 g smoked ham, cubed (or chorizo will do nicely)

- 2 cups chopped cajun vegetables
- 2 cloves garlic
- 2 tablespoons vegetable oil
- 425g can chopped tomatoes
- 21/2 cups long grain rice
- 2 teaspoons cajun spice mix

Method:

- 1. Fry chicken with ham in the oil in batches until browned. Add cajun vegetables and garlic, and cook until golden.
- 2. Add tomatoes, rice, chicken stock, cajun spice mix and bring to boil.
- 3. Pour into greased casserole dish, bake at 180° C for about one hour. The rice should be slightly crispy on top.



Jambalaya can also be made with seafood. It is thought to have been introduced to the Cajuns by local Indian tribes. *Maque choux* is a side dish, often served with jambalaya.



Cajun vegetables

Ingredients:

- 1 large brown onion
- 1 green capsicum
- 2 celery stalks

Method:

Finely chop vegetables.

Maque choux

Ingredients:

8 ears of corn (or 2 x 420 gm tins of corn kernels)

- 1 teaspoon unsalted butter
- 1 teaspoon vegetable oil
- ½ brown onion finely chopped
- ½ green capsicum finely chopped
- ½ teaspoon white pepper
- ½ teaspoon cayenne pepper
- 250gm chopped tomatoes
- Salt to taste
- 11/2 tablespoons whipping cream

Method:

- Cut kernels from the corn cobs (if using). In a frying pan, heat
 oil and butter and cook onions and capsicum until softened.
 Add corn and peppers, cooking until corn starts to stick to
 the pan, about five to seven minutes.
- Add tomatoes, salt and cream. Cook until thick, about eight to ten minutes.
- 3. Serve hot as a side for the jambalaya.



With the ever-increasing use of our outdoor spaces, the use of pots as a solution for growing plants is becoming far greater than in previous times, and the opportunity is right to offer some hints on how to successfully manage this form of gardening.

Probably the most important initial issue is to decide what do you want the pots and the plants to achieve? Are they to be used for growing vegetables, providing annual colour, for perennials or shrubs or, perhaps, a screening plant to hide a shed or some unsightly part of the landscape?

The pot size is absolutely the most crucial selection as a pot too small for the plant will cause it to dry out quickly, blow over in the wind or not be large enough to contain sufficient nutrients and water to keep the plant healthy.

Generally, glazed pots are the best as there are many colours that suit the colour scheme of the home, and these pots have a better moisture-holding capability than other styles. There are some very interesting forms of light-weight pots on the market now and these are easy to use as they are very light and come in some very interesting shapes and sizes. Terracotta pots are very stylish but tend to dry out, so if this style is to be used, seal the inside of the pot with a terracotta sealant.

When selecting a pot that might be used to gradually enlarge to the next size as the plant grows use a straight-sided or vee-shaped pot so the plant can be easily removed. A pot which is belly shaped is nigh on impossible to repot without causing serious disturbance to the root system or breaking the pot.

Going Potty



When selecting the plant to be used consider the eventual size of the plant, remembering that the larger the plant grows, the larger the pot should be. A plant that is to be used for screening should be in a pot that will also act as an anchor in a windy site. Too small a pot will simply blow over and, in most cases, break.

If you are growing annuals, herbs and vegetables, a shallow pot will suffice as they are all generally shallow rooting and do not need a great depth of soil.


The potting mix used should be a

premium mix including some slow-release fertiliser and some water storage crystals. There are many types of mixes out there but the cheaper the mix, the lesser the quality. Cheaper mixes are basically just pine bark and if you are growing vegetables and annual flowers you will need to fertilise and water more often as these mixes do not have any moisture or nutrient holding capabilities. The cheaper mixes will be of no benefit to the plants after a season or two.

Watering and fertilising are critically important. Vegetables and annual flowers will need watering several times a week and require fertilising every ten days or so with a liquid fertiliser like a fish- or seaweed-based fertiliser. Shrubs and longer-living plants also need watering and fertilising on a regular basis although, with the fertilising, add a specific slow-release fertiliser for the particular group of plants you have used. Do this three or four times a year as well as the liquid food on a monthly basis. During the cooler months this can be cut back as the plants are not actively growing.


Just a few other things to remember include checking from time to time that the drainage holes haven't become blocked by roots, rotate the pots to get even, all-over growth and prune when necessary.
