Proposed changes to Eden-Monaro's electoral boundaries

All residents of the Triangle region live in the Federal seat of Eden-Monaro and all of us live in the State seat of Bega. However, the southern section is in the Bega Valley Local Government Area (LGA) and, in the north, the Eurobodalla LGA is split between the Federal seats of Eden-Monaro and Gilmore.

The 2024 proposed electoral boundary changes will not change our inclusion in Eden-Monaro, but I thought some readers might be interested in the draft proposal released last week. The previous electoral boundary change saw Tuross Heads, Moruya and Batemans Bay move to the Federal seat of Gilmore and Eden-Monaro went west to include Tumut, Tumbarumba, Batlow (the Snowy Valleys LGA) and Yass and Murrumbateman (Yass Valley LGA). The current proposal suggests returning Tuross Heads to Eden-Monaro, retaining the Snowy Mountains towns of Cooma,

Thredbo, Adaminaby and Jindabyne and gaining Goulburn and Marulan.

Anyone really curious about these proposed changes, can visit the AEC website, type 'Proposed redistribution of NSW electoral divisions' into the search bar and then click on Eden-Monaro under the maps heading.

Meet your local rural fire brigades



What is a JP?

Justices of the Peace (JPs) are volunteers appointed by the Governor of New South Wales. Their activities are supervised by the Attorney General of NSW under the Justices of the Peace Act 2002.

JPs are usually highly respected individuals who come from all sections of the community and are located across NSW. A JP has to pass a knowledge test and take an Oath of Office before a NSW court. They must always comply with legal requirements and the JP Code of Conduct. A JP's contact details are public – their full name, a contact number, language/s spoken, and the suburb or town and postcode where they usually provide JP services.

What can a JP do?

JPs have three primary functions:

- to witness a statutory declaration
- to witness an affidavit
- to certify a copy of an original document.

Generally, a JP in NSW must be physically present to exercise these functions. If authorised by the law of another State of Australia, a NSW JP can witness or certify documents for use in that other State.

A JP must act honestly and fairly, remain independent and impartial, deal with requests for JP services in a timely



manner and must not unreasonably refuse to provide JP services.

What must a JP NOT do?

- charge a fee or accept a gift for providing JP services
- act if subject to a conflict of interest.

• reveal information that is private, confidential or commercially sensitive

- assist or write in a statutory declaration or affidavit
- provide legal advice
- draw up or store copies of legal documents
- witness or certify documents for use outside Australia.

How do I find a JP (NSW Justice

of the Peace) in my area?

1. Search the 'JP Online' register.

2. Go to a local community desk.

Ask at local places if there is a JP at a location near you (e.g. local council or shire offices, a police station or a courthouse, the office of your local MP, shopping centre, library, chemist or bank.)

The NSW Department of Communities and Justice publishes a JP Handbook that is available online or by request for the reference of all members of the public.

Macquarie University Survey Building climate-ready communities and health systems

In the face of more frequent and intense events driven by climate change, such as the 2019 Australian Black Summer bushfires, we can no longer afford to ignore the impact of climate change on our health. As bushfires and floods become more common, health conditions such as asthma and heat-related illnesses will increase. Climate change events like storms can also lead to road closures or blackouts, making it harder to access healthcare when needed.

At Macquarie University, we are supporting health systems to cope with the new challenges brought about by climate change and are seeking to prepare communities to stay safe and healthy when and where climate crises strike. Our team of researchers come from different backgrounds and areas of expertise. We want to find ways to reduce climate change's negative effects on health and ensure everyone, regardless of their circumstances, has access to appropriate healthcare and can be prepared.

To help us understand the needs of people who are managing a health condition during an extreme weather event, we are seeking people to tell their personal stories. Volunteers will take part in an interview to share their recent experiences managing a health condition during a disaster such as a bushfire, flood or storm. We aim to understand the health challenges they faced and the solutions they found. We will use this information to design new ways the health system can support the long-term needs of communities in the face of environmental shifts. Sharing your experience can pave the way to a more resilient, prepared community and help the health system plan for future climate-related disasters. Honorbread – now in Narooma!

As she handed over my triple-shot coffee on a sunny winter morning, Amanda explained that locals are still discovering the new Honorbread outlet in Narooma. 'When they find us, people are just excited to have a good bakery in town again,' she said. Her next customer agreed.

Bless you, Bermi, we all love an excuse to visit, but my olive and rosemary loaves taste better with reduced carbon miles. Standing in line, I bumped into local Narooma vet Kate, who told me that she too is enjoying buying bread closer to home.

Located in mid-town next to an art shop and up from the Post Office, people wandering into the new Honorbread shop are enjoying a breakfast bun or muesli, a hot lunch with salad and, surely, to worship another black tahini and honey scroll.

'I bake, and use Honor's sourdough starter, but I come here for the coffee. Great coffee is hard to find,' Toby told me while tucking into some toast. Tasha nodded while munching muesli next to me at the inside bar table, telling me she comes in for the bread weekly.

Honor explains that she and Tim had been looking for a location on the sunny side of the street in mid-town Narooma for the last five or six years. While taking a squiz at the new art shop, a real estate agent pointed out that the Chinese restaurant next door was closing down. Given the location and prior food approvals for the site, everything seemed to finally align.

'What really drives me is the fact that forty local people, up to fifty in the peak season, now rely on our bakery for their livelihoods. I want to ensure they can have enough shifts to live well, so we are growing. We have been open for nearly a decade in Bermi and it's exciting to have the scope to keep doing new things and selling them in a different location. I also really enjoy making and sharing great bread.'

When I asked her how the business differs in Narooma, Honor has noticed that Narooma is more of a working town, so more salads and lunches fly out the door compared to Bermi. 'Another great thing about Narooma is that it's close enough to Bermi so food quality is not lost in transportation, which particularly affects pastries.'

Keep cranking them out, Honor and team!

Talking about end-of-life issues has become so prevalent that in 2023 the Hon NSW Minister for Seniors, Jodie Harrison, hosted a Dying to Know Day launch at NSW Parliament House

I've been fortunate that Eurobodalla Council has recognised the importance of supporting its community with end-of-life education and, once again, this year I am running free workshops at all three of their libraries in August.

These info sessions are designed to help you identify your values for a fulfilling life and death, design a personalised funeral that reflects your essence, begin a 'Life Snapshot' journal of your meaningful moments, record your wishes and guide you on how to have sensitive discussions with your family.

That's a lot to cover I know, but I'll be providing simple handouts that will make the process easier.

Construction commences for Rebuild Cobargo

The construction phase of the Rebuild Cobargo Project, as announced by the Cobargo Community Development Corporation (CCDC), is on track with Monarch Building Solutions.

On Saturday 25 May, the CCDC held a Public Information Day in the Cobargo School of Arts Hall bringing together the builders' representatives, local trades people and other interested community members.

The event was well attended and took the form of a more informal meet and greet activity. Several trades people took the opportunity to complete Local Trades Expression of Interest (EOI) forms that have gone directly to the builders. Monarch also had the building graphics and details on public display at the Hall to help provide context for those interested.

The detailed architectural design documents for the buildings and the EOI form can be accessed via the CCDC website for general information and for those still wishing to register their interest in being part of the rebuild but were unable to attend on the day.

Following the completion of the

underground power work by Essential Energy in April, and continuing from the already completed pre-construction activities, Monarch have started with site preparations including reconstruction work of the culvert and laneway at the rear of the eastern sites to allow easier site access to the rear near the new Post Office and Market Hall.

As the project's construction phase continues, the CCDC will continue to provide monthly updates via *The Triangle*. *The* CCDC website will also be updated regularly with project news. In addition, keep an eye on the local community email networks and community notice boards around the village for notification of future Public Information Days.

Botanic Gardens excursion

On Wednesday 29 May, the Barranguba class (Years 3 to 6) went to the Eurobodalla Regional Botanic Gardens in Batemans Bay for the day. Each group was allocated a Botanic Gardens guide who showed each group around, naming and teaching us about the plants, fungi and animal scats.

We were told that if you were to cut the tree the lines inside the trunk would indicate how old it was and it would be over 300 years old. After the guided tour, we were taken to an open classroom where we were taught more about plants and how they reproduce. We took a closer look at different plants through a microscope. Then we got to re-pot a seedling. The plants that we re-potted were important because they sell them to fund the Botanic Gardens.

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In a little nook at the top end of Bate Street in Central Tilba is a store built on the 'heirloom principle'. The store was opened in June by Tilba locals, Nicole and Grant Clark, who value sustainability, longevity and bringing back purposeful products for children. Sawdust and Chalk chooses only quality, long-lasting products that foster imagination in children; they're not into quick-pick toys that end up in the trash in six months.

'We're definitely about toys that will be repurposed and handed down. My kids still play with my father's and my own childhood building blocks. They're heirlooms,' says Nicole.

The store is focused on kids - big and small. Their products are all handmade from sustainable components under Fair-Trade principles, locally made where possible, and those items that come from Germany, Spain and around Australia all run to the same 'purposeful' ethos.

'We're the complete opposite to large chain stores,' says Nicole. 'We're more expensive, but our toys are designed to last through the generations and don't come at the expense of others. I think it's good

for people to question why items can be so cheap.'

A lot of the toys are Steiner influenced. Nicole's motivation is for children to use their imagination to use toys for a number of purposes instead of playing with something pre-built.

As well as building blocks and Connetix (magnetic tiles) made from recycled plastics, there is a range of baby clothes including the handmade local Kakadu collection with tie-dyed and handmade dresses and vests.

And, of course, there's the play mat where parents can join their children in experiencing the toys first hand.

'After a high-profile career that took me around the world, I had to find things that made parenting fun for me. As a parent, it's about bringing back those childhood feelings - you have to learn how to play all over again,' says Nicole.

All toys are vetted by the couple's three children Grace 10, Pippy 8 and Goldie 3. If they don't get a seal of approval from the three girls, the toys aren't stocked. It's truly a family business. Shanna Provost

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There's a blue whisp of aromatic smoke from a cottage chimney, the grind and clunk of a battery-powered pruner and a charming garden path strewn with vibrant autumn leaves and snappy twigs. Walk a bit further and you can see tree limbs swaying and hear the odd crack of a branch. Turn the corner and there they are - the Feed Diggies group, gloved, booted, down in the dirt and reaching up into bushes, working together to help one household get through some garden jobs fast. Yes, after a bit of a break, Feed Diggies recently met at Jen's place for a working bee. Just four of us this time but, boy, we managed a lot in four hours. A comprehensive prune of some fruit trees and a massive hack back of buddleia – thanks, Angela, for the tips on where best to prune on the peach branches. Then a good old tidy and weed of the entrance area and chook enclosure as well as stacking said prunings for a later pile burn. Then there was the inevitable (and fun) sharing of cuttings from some prized and coveted plants. We also found a mystery fruit on a gorgeous tree that Jen had planted years ago (research and cross-referencing with the rest of the group identified it as a type of quince).

Working bees buzzing

When the jobs were done, we stood back and admired our handiwork. What a transformation! These working bees achieve so much - but it's about more than just getting through the work of foodgardening. It might be a cliché, but the whole really is worth a mountain more than the sum of its parts. We might feel daunted by the tasks to be tackled when we arrive at a working bee but, within moments, people find their flow, help, laugh, joke, work pleasurably in silence in the sun, slurp from their water bottles, pat dogs, ask 'what's that plant?', stand up, stretch and stare at the impressive, beautiful bush. The lunch break is a chance to flop down and rest, enjoy some home-cooked and wholesome delicious food, chat, share stories, admire each other's place (and Jen's almost-completed, unique hand-built place has the ultimate wow factor). We give and receive wisdom and musings on plants, recipes, soil, compost, weeds, chooks, just about everything. At the end of the working bee, we are left feeling tired and elated, better connected and cherished as neighbours and friends. The sense of fun, the goodwill, laughter and the learning are amazing. Can't wait till the next one.

Koalas spotted

Joy! Dignams Creek residents were ecstatic to hear that koalas have again been sighted in Dignams Creek. Koalas have been under extreme pressure from habitat loss and the 2019-20 fires had a devastating effect. Numbers in the Eurobodalla are incredibly low, with no koalas seen for three years. So, sighting two koalas in the tree canopy of Kooraban National Park in Dignams Creek is exciting news (Kooraban means koala in local Yuin language). The announcement of the sighting came after drone surveys were used to check known potential koala habitat in Eurobodalla and Southern Shoalhaven. The surveys are part of the Eurobodalla Koala Recovery Project, led by the Coastwatchers Association in partnership with National Parks and Wildlife Service and Forestry Corporation of NSW. The project is part of the Eurobodalla Koala Recovery Strategy which, in addition to searching for koalas and mapping sightings, is also planting 6,000 koala food trees in strategic parts of the project area.

Still on the topic of koalas, a section of land in Dignams Creek has also just become part of a recent expansion of Gulaga National Park. Great news - this will further support habitat protection for these adorable (and currently, in this location, endangered) creatures. Well, we've heard that The Koala Action Network had a free open day in Bega on Saturday 29 June, 11.00 am - 2.30 pm. Those who attended heard about koalas in the forested coastal ranges between the Bega and Bermagui Rivers. There was also information on the NSW Koala Strategy and its projects. It was surely an interesting day!

Like a lot of community groups, Dignams Creek Community Group has just had its AGM. Despite the chilly wind we braved it with our hats and scarves and some warm-hearted banter. The meeting reminded us that the group has been going for thirty years. A special thankyou to Merryn Carey who has been the group's Public Officer for the duration. Wow, big effort Merryn! Your community salutes your dedication, and you definitely deserve the break you're taking from this role. As well as reshuffling all office bearers this time (thanks to those outgoing and welcome to all newcomers), the AGM gave us all the chance to catch up on projects. Bermagui Community Forum

The Bermagui River is one of the most popular estuaries within the Bega Valley for recreation and is also commercially important for oyster aquaculture, recreational fishing and marina operations at the harbour near the ocean entrance. All commercial fishing in the river has been prohibited since 2002.

The river is regarded as one of the most pristine estuaries in the Bega Valley Shire. The significant ecological values of the estuary include its clear waters, tidal flows, extensive saltmarsh, mangrove and seagrass. The estuary represents a key attraction for residents and tourists.

Council has produced a very detailed and lengthy (150 pages) Draft Bermagui Coastal Management Plan for comment.

The recently released Draft Council

Budget for 2024-25 includes a grantfunded \$4.2 million major project identified as 'Cuttagee Bridge renewal'.

It is good that Council is initiating this grant-funded project but given the level of community interest in the outcome, the Forum suggests Council briefly provides some detail about how the money will be spent. Is it for the options assessment? Cost benefit analysis? Preliminary architectural designs? Any community engagement?

Council to draft an Affordable Housing Contributions Policy, 13 June 2024

Following a feasibility analysis for affordable housing contributions in the Bega Valley Shire, Council will develop an Affordable Housing Contributions Policy.

The words 'strategies, policies and feasibility studies' always send out alarm bells to me when there is real and urgent need for a sector of the community that is really struggling.

What kid doesn't love to watch construction vehicles? At the preschool, Bermi kids have had a wonderful time watching big cranes, cement mixers and workmen carrying out construction work, and it is reflected in their play.

The children have used the recent real life construction projects in and around the Preschool and community as inspiration for their play and learning. They have watched the trades people at work and then transferred this information to their imaginative play and games. The children's cubby building has taken on elements of design and engineering as the children have constructed elaborate spaces with blankets, pegs, cardboard boxes and other resources. Lego and blocks have been used in building planning, design and construction projects. Outside the trucks, trowels and blocks have been used in play to concrete, cement and render block walls and build paths and roads. These are just a few of the examples of the activities the children have engaged in to learn fundamental engineering, maths, science and technology skills through their play.

An important way for kids to learn through watching real experiences and reenacting them through play.

They've got more funding – yay! So, we're likely to see more free classes popping up to keep us active and engaged. Carmel Conway: 19.09.1934 – 30.05.2024

In 1963 there was a big house for sale on the outskirts of Cooma, for a very reasonable price. Too reasonable. A migrant couple with three growing boys, the father working as a panel beater, went to have a look. It needed some work but the couple, between them, had the skills so they bought it. But soon cars started arriving. Single men, or groups of them – the house, it turned out, had been a brothel.

At night, when the father was home, he could send them off with his shotgun and some harsh words. Sometimes a shot through the radiator was needed. But during the day the menfolk of Cooma encountered Carmel Elizabeth Conway, shotgun hugged to her hip, her boys under strict instructions to stay inside. She wasn't averse to letting off a shot when required either.

Present-day Triangle locals may have trouble reconciling this image with the slender, girlish woman they came to know and love, with her long plaits, ankle-length skirts and gentle Irish lilt. Carmel and Joe brought their sons Joe, Brendan and Eamon to Quaama in 1979, buying an old slab cottage on Bermaguee Street. Carmel would ride around town on her bicycle, her beloved cockatoo Timmi perched on the handlebars. But it was during her Quaama years that tragedy struck. First Joe Senior contracted cancer. Then Eamon, who had moved to Sydney with his brothers, died in a motorbike accident. That spelled the end for Joe Senior, who passed away three weeks later. Another eighteen months and Brendan was also dead – another bike accident.



Carmel's indomitable love for life touched all those whose paths she crossed.

In unfathomable depths of grief, Carmel grew a garden. Her neighbour Stan worked at a nursery and would bring her 'pots of dead sticks', and she would bring them back to life. Over the years her half acre became a rambling, verdant sprawl of beds, paths, hedges and secret rooms, as Carmel came to terms with her losses.

In 1997 Carmel sold the Quaama property (this is when I, the new owner, was lucky to meet her) and moved to Bermagui. She took up golf. She met Jim Jubb, whose property backed onto the golf course, and the two fell in love – 'a grand love', she told me just a few years later at his funeral. It seemed that tragedy and death were stalking her, yet her indomitable love for life carried her through and touched all those whose paths she crossed.

Carmel, aged 89, died in her sleep on the night of Wednesday 29 May, after spending the day with her surviving son, Joe, visiting her special spots – Dickinson Point, the Blue Pool and her favourite, Cuttagee Headland. 'I'll be popping off now', she'd told Joe and her dear friend and neighbour Madeline that day.

Rest in peace, Carmel, you'll be sorely missed.

The Thursday Murder Club

(and the next three in the series)

Richard Osman Penguin **RRP \$32.000**

In 2020, forty publishers bid for the rights to this first novel by television presenter and producer, Richard Osman. It has become the biggest selling adult crime novel since records began and Spielberg immediately purchased the film rights. Osman has since written three more novels in the series with equal success: The man who died twice in 2021, The bullet that missed in 2022 and The last devil to die in 2023. He is now about to publish the first book in a new series and The Thursday Murder Club film is in production with a star-studded cast.

So why all the fuss for a cosy crime series?

It's the setting, the characters and the writing. The setting is an upmarket retirement village with swimming pool, leisure activities and an excellent restaurant with fine wines. The main characters are: Elizabeth, an ex-spy with contacts and enemies in high places; Joyce, a former nurse who cooks and wears pastels -Joyce may not be noticed but she notices everything; Ebrahim, originally from Egypt is fastidious and was a psychiatrist with a great and knowing generosity; and Ron was a trade union leader with strong opinions and a love of football.

They have a lifetimes of experience, of empathy and all the joys and sorrows of a long life. They have seen it all. Throughout the series we learn their backstories. The one thing they have in common is that they have grown older and become invisible but rage against the common depiction of old age. They fit together because these novels are essentially about friendship and longing and being true to who we are. This makes it so much more than a cosy crime novel and accounts for its success. All the main and lesser characters are fully drawn. These are not plot driven novels they are characters driven and the reader falls in love with them and knows them well.

The writing is very funny, very British, at times tragic-comic and also at times unbearably poignant.

I want more.

Garden Tetris

Garden Tetris is a lot like the video game, but instead of trying to arrange falling coloured blocks, it's plants you are trying to fit together efficiently within a limited space. Like the game it can take some practice. That supposedly short plant you stuck in on the edge turns out much taller than you expected, the one you put in the shade needs more sun (or vice versa), that climber would be nicer over there instead, that plant needs dividing and those two plants would look much better side by side. Game on.

July is one of the best times to play Garden Tetris. In midwinter, many plants will have paused their growing, exhausted their flowering and fruit/seed production and will be gathering their energy for the upcoming spring. Digging them up now will result in minimal disturbance, and they will be settled in their new

position, ready to grow again when the warmer weather arrives.

Before you move a plant, it is beneficial to prune it first as moving a plant disturbs the root system reducing the plant's ability to absorb nutrients and water. The corresponding reduction of the above ground parts makes it easier for the smaller root ball to do its job and satisfy the whole plant. The other thing to do before you move a plant is to have the new planting hole prepared and ready to go, thereby limiting the time the plant is out of the ground.

Before you dig, imagine the plant in a pot. You should aim to dig out a pot-sized root ball at least. The more roots you can bring with the plant the more successful the move is likely to be. Chop/dig right the way around the plant first, and then try and lever it out from below. Larger roots should be cut cleanly with sharp secateurs. Support the root ball whilst transferring the plant to its new hole and ensure that it is sitting at the same depth as in the old location.

Before you backfill, flood the planting hole and root ball with water and let it soak away. Backfill, then give another drink, this time with some added soil conditioner like seaweed extract or fish emulsion. Hold off on fertilising until you start to see the first signs of new growth. Game over.

Now study the garden for another year, note your next moves, and prepare to play again the following July.

Meanwhile, around the town gardens, the camellias continue to shine and the normally non- descript, hardy succulent shrubs, *Crassula ovata* (jade plant) are bursting as they enter peak flowering season. The banksias and grevilleas are also having a flowering flush.

In the wild places, on the sides of the road around the Triangle, the bushland is rather homogenously green at present, with very few obvious flowers currently.

Finally, this month in the veggie garden we continue catering to the cooler weather and so are mostly still limited to planting leeks, shallots or onions, peas of any description as well as broad beans and lettuce.

Pumpkin Time

I'm a great fan of using seasonal vegetables ... produce that is at its peak at a particular time of year. At the moment, there are lots of pumpkins available and they are perfect for hearty winter dishes,

inexpensive and can be used in so many ways. There is always delicious pumpkin soup, creamy and smooth, but here are a couple of interesting alternatives, one sweet, one savoury

Tart case:

I use a sweet short crust pastry but substitute one cup of walnuts for flour. A blender is perfect for this, but it can be made by hand.

> Blitz one cup walnuts till it's like breadcrumbs. Add 125 g chilled butter cubed and 1½ cups plain flour (your choice, I use gluten free).

When the mixture comes together, turn out onto a floured surface and work a little. Shape into a rectangle and chill in refrigerator till firm. Gently roll out and line a tart tin lined with baking paper. I divide the pastry into two to make it easier. Roll out gently to fit. Don't worry if it breaks as you can push it together, just don't leave any cracks or gaps.

Put baking paper on top and fill with dried beans or rice and bake in mod oven for 30 mins or till coloured. Remove from oven and cool on rack. Remove beans and paper.

Filling:

Pumpkin and Walnut Tart

Approximately 500 gms peeled pumpkin cut into smallish chunks – roast or steam. When cooled a little place in blender with 4 lightly beaten eggs, 1 cup brown or coconut sugar or $\frac{1}{2}$ cup maple syrup and 1 cup coconut cream. Add one teaspoon mixed spice. Blend till well mixed.

Pour into completely cooled tart case and bake for approx 45 mins. Don't overcook ... just firm on top as it will set when cool.

Ingredients:

- 1 kg (approx.) pumpkin peeled and cubed
- 1 brown onion, diced
- 3 cloves garlic, sliced or chopped fine
- 1 fresh chilli, your choice, finely chopped
- 1 tablespoon of finely sliced ginger
- 1 teaspoon each: mustard seeds, turmeric
- 1 bunch coriander (replace with chopped parsley and celery if you like)
- 20 curry leaves ... or a tablespoon good curry mix with those ingredients
- 1 tin chopped tomatoes
- 2 tins coconut milk
- 2 tins chickpeas.

Pumpkin, chickpea and coconut curry

Method:

Put ¼ cup of a good nut oil in saucepan over high heat. Add onion, garlic, chillies, ginger and cook. Reduce to medium and cook till softened. Add spices or curry mix. Add tomatoes and coconut milk. Bring to boil, add pumpkin and chickpeas. Reduce to low, cover and simmer for 45 mins. Add more water if too dry. Take lid off and cook for a further 10 mins till sauce thickens.

Serve with rice, naan bread, chutneys and dips.

If you still have a mountain of pumpkin, cook some off, mash and freeze. It makes a great 'filler' for so many dishes and is terrific in your dog's food.
